ANOTHER BURDEN.

In the case of D. B. Monteith respond ent agt. E. A. Parker, city treasurer, the supeme court yesterday decided the case against the ci'y, reversing the decision of the circuit court.

Here is substantially the case: Upon the completion of the big bridge in 1892 at a cost of a little over \$91,000 there was no's ifficient money in the bridge fund to liqu date in full, so warrants were issued in favor of the Portland Bridge Co., of e o 1 March 9, 1892 for \$3,189.68, one on april 27 for \$5,000 and the final one on July 2, 1892 for \$884.30, a total of \$9,073.98. In 1895 the city wold \$20,000 in bonds to pay the floating warrants including this warrant, which were drawing 8 per cent, thus saving 2 per cent per cluding this warrant, which were drawing 8 per cent, thus saving 2 per cent per year. Immediately D. B. Monteith and there, claiming that the city was not liable for interest on the warrants, enjoined the payment of the same, and the case has been pending in different forms since. For over three years, the money remained id'e while the 8 per cent interest never slept, so on Sept. 29, 1898, under a contract with the bridge company \$7,203,94 was paid on the principal leaving a balance of \$1,570.02 due on the principal, an amount that had gradually principal, an amount that had gradually leaked into other funds of the ciry's bus-iness.
