An Able Lecture.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, one of Oregon's ablest and most cultured lawyers gave an address last evening in the Congregational church on "Woman's No." The essence of the address was that a greater civilization is to be wrought through the influence and strength of women. Men in nearly everything they do are asking, "Will it pay," so that when one sees a person standing for truth and right regardless of consequences the sight is a pleasing one. Reference, Florence Nightingale for humanity, Booker Washington for the education of the colored people.

If men will not do it women have several big problems to solve:

First, that of the aggregation of wealth. The speaker takes the position that the only remedy against trusts will be the golden rule. We need righteous rich men, such as Wendell Phillips and Wilberforce were.

Second, that of extreme wealth, during which a fine tribute was paid to the W. C. T. U. which stands for humanity. We need men who will stand for the under dog more.

Third, the press, the great metropolitan press being an instrument for the spreading of sensationalism, the tool of the money power. The country press though, is all right, exerting an influence for good, and as a rule, incorruptible. We need more Greeleys.

Fourth, politics, now dominated by bosses. We need more people willing to down the bosses and smash the machines.

Fifth, patriotism, the genuine spirit of which should be fostered and advanced. The address was appreciated by all fortunate in hearing it.
