BUSH WILSON.—The Corvallis Times pays a two column tribute to the late Bush Wilson, for thirty years county clerk of Benton county. He was born in Maine, July 18, 1824. He was a resident of New York city for several years and became acquainted with people who have since become celebrated, Charlotte Oushman, Prof. Morse, the inventor, Horace Greeley with whom he worked, Nathaniel Miles, author of a famous hymn "Precious Promise God Hath Given," who was his cousin. He afterwards lived in Illinois. He was at sea for awhile, once going around the world, also navigating the Mediterraean and the Great Lakes. The gold fever brought him west and from California to Oregon coming into the state in a canoe up the Umpqua. He was married in 1856 to Priscilla Yantis of this county. After being on the river while he got into the county clerk business, and stuck.
