

Mr. Tongue Scored.

In connection with the candidacy of Judge J. J. Whitney for Congress the Eugene Journal says:

The republican ticket had to be elected from top to bottom, regardless of men or measures, "to sustain the administration," as the salaried liars of the "mercenary brigade" howled and wailed all over Oregon. The life of every volunteer depended upon the success of "the party," according to these liars, and the fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, cousins and aunts were rounded up to support the ticket without inquiring who were on it or what they were there for, or how they got there. The fact that Governor Lord and the men supported for the various offices by the leaders of the party were beaten by only a few votes by the faction that was repudiated by the legislature of 1897, and the members of the "push" run in on them did not cut any figure. It was the ticket that was voted for and not the men. That was lucky for the Hon. Thomas H. Tongue. He was elected two years before by 63 plurality over the populist candidate, Vanderberg, while Jeff Myers, the democratic nominee, had 7,914 votes leaving Tongue a minority of nearly 8000 votes. He would have been snowed under in 1898 by an immense majority had it not been for the Spanish war. McKinley is still keeping up the war on his own hook, at great expense in money and lives to the American people, as a political necessity to carry elections and retain power. It remains to be seen whether the people will be carried away by a war of "criminal aggression," as he named it, as they were by the war to free the Cubans and Filipinos from Spanish tyranny and give them liberty? The Spanish war, which carried the election in Oregon in 1898, was to give them and Filipinos liberty, while McKinley's war, which is being carried on now in the hope of carrying the elections of 1900, is to prevent the Filipinos from gaining their liberty. As the purpose is different the result in the elections may be different. Judge Waldo, of Marion Co., would make an excellent representative in Congress if he would accept and should be the choice of the convention. Hon. R. M. Veatch would also do credit to the district. He would have been elected over Tongue two years ago but for the Spanish war. He made a splendid run and is a very popular man. If the war racket cannot again be played on the people either Whitney, Waldo, Veatch or perhaps any other good man could easily be elected this year, but if the war can be kept up and made to play its part on the prejudices of the people the best and most popular man that ever lived could not be elected over the most insignificant scoundrel that travels on two feet. This is not meant to disparage Mr. Tongue, for he is an able man and he is a popular. There are plenty of other men in the district besides those named who would make good Congressmen. We have no candidate and only suggest these three names as being well qualified and popular, and to call attention to the subject. No doubt other names will be suggested before the nomination is made.

The White Mantle of Peace

The Albany Democrat is commenting upon the fatality of the battle at Spionkop in which 1700 Boers and 1900 English are reported killed, the British army lost 40 per cent of the number engaged says: "And what is all this slaughter for in this civilized age of the world when the white mantle of peace should enshroud the world." Well this is refreshing; especially this civilized age, in which the United States has just finished civilizing Spain by sinking her fleet of war vessels and depleting her infantry, only to continue her bloody work in the Philippines, where it still goes on. England and the Dutch republics of South Africa are in the midst of a fierce war; Venezuela is in the throes of a revolution; Mexico has internal strife; Kentucky is in an advanced stage of civilization; Russia and Japan are rushing the dove of peace in order to mobilize their warships in close proximity to the island of Make-Sore-Eyes (Mac-Soy-Yi), and in fact each civilized nation, as well as each of the uncivilized ones, is standing with a chip poised merely waiting a knock off blow, little matter whether by design or accident. Then, too, the relentless monopolists are speeding civilization at a rate which promises to topple over the whole concern in a few decades, and this is called "a civilized age" in such manner as to lead one to conclude that it has reached an advanced state. This white mantle of peace is but a bloody rag, and a may well wonder what the word civilization means.

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TELEGRAPHIC

The Capital in Danger.

LONDON, March 13, 9:45 A. M.—The war office has received the following additional dispatch from Lord Roberts at Pretoria: "The Boers."

Our march was again unopposed. We are now about 18 miles from Bloemfontein. The cavalry division is astride the railway 6 miles south of Bloemfontein. There are 321 men wounded. About 60 or 70 men were killed or are missing.

Good for Simon.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Senator Simon has been from the first a supporter of the position of the President with respect to Puerto Rico. He has been for free trade and against the House bill from the first.

"I have talked with many Senators on this subject," said Simon, "and have urged them to take the same stand. Without taking up the Constitutional question at all, there is enough merit in extending free trade to this island to make it compulsory upon us to do so."

Arbitrary Program.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Today, for the second time within a week, a democrat was unseated by the house and a republican seated in his place. R. A. Wise was given the seat hitherto occupied by W. A. Young from the second Virginia District.

In Kentucky.

FRANKFORT, March 12.—The situation in Frankfort tonight shows a radical improvement from that of 24 hrs ago. Public excitement worked up to the highest pitch by the arrests of Secretary of State Powers, Captain Davis and the others accused of complicity in the assassination of Governor Goebel.

Kruger's Appeal.

THE HAGUE, March 12.—It is learned from a reliable source that President Kruger through the consuls at Pretoria, has appealed for intervention of the great powers in the Transvaal War. He has also appealed to the government of Belgium, Holland and Switzerland.

A Rich Find.

SEATTLE, March 12.—Two men left at Dawson City from Cape Nome, who left the latter place eight days after Carl Knobelsdorf and C. D. Campbell, tell a wonderful story of what is claimed to be the richest find made in the north. The new field is 100 miles from Nome, and stories of the fabulous wealth were being passed from mouth to mouth at Nome when the latest arrivals left there December 18.

Some Fighting.

DRIEFONTEN, March 11, 6:35 A. M.—Broadwood's cavalry brigade, advancing on Bloemfontein unexpectedly found the Boers in a strong position in the Driefonten kopje's yesterday. General Kelly-Kenny's divisions arriving, severe fighting ensued. The Boers resisted stubbornly but were driven from their center position, leaving a number of dead and 40 prisoners. The British force is moving forward today.

Peace Terms.

LONDON, March 12.—The Daily Mail has received the following dispatch from Pretoria, dated Saturday, and censored by the Boer government: President Kruger and President Steyn have wired to Lord Salisbury peace proposals on condition that the independence of the Republic be respected and the rebel colonies annexed.

Yesterday the foreign consuls were called into conference and were requested to invite the intervention of the powers they represented in order to prevent further bloodshed.

Looks Warlike.

FRANKFORT, March 11.—The democrats and republicans are today, for the first time since the present political complications assumed acute form, divided into two armed and organized factions. Surrounding the capitol and the State Executive building, and encamped in the grounds around Governor Taylor's home, are nearly 200 State Militia, well provided with ammunition, while in the corridors of the capitol hotel, in which the democratic state executive offices are located and in their adjacent building are 60 special officers and the men and boys of a militia company that was organized in Frankfort.

Terrible Tragedy.

POMEROY, Wash., March 11.—A terrible tragedy occurred about 2:30 this morning at the Falling Springs, five miles northwest of this city. Henry Williams a young man, 28 years old, after trying to kill his wife, his mother in law and several negro boys, committed suicide by hanging himself through the beam. Williams separated from his wife a young woman, about five months ago.

Making Will Fail.

LONDON, March 12.—A correspondent of the Daily Mail at Lourenco Marques, telegraphing Saturday, says: According to Boer reports the fall of Mafeking is certain. There has been heavy fighting this week and the Boers have been shelling the town from all the outlying forts, which they have captured.

FRANKFORT, March 13.—The legislature of Kentucky adjourned sine die today. A conference between Adjutant-General Collier and Castleman resulted in a perfect understanding being reached. Governor Taylor will continue to act as Governor. Governor Beckham will move toward securing possession of the state buildings until the Court of Appeals has decided the matter.

The Boers.

CAPE TOWN, March 14.—The Canadians from Victoria West proceeded to the Frieska district. A Kimberley farmer, who has just returned from a trip to Barkly West, reports that the country is almost deserted. He covered a distance of 75 miles. Boers are said to be massing a strong force on the Vaal river, in the neighborhood of the Klip Dam.

Fatal Accident.

BAKER CITY, March 13.—By an accident that occurred last night on the O. R. & N., near Pleasant Valley, 12 miles from this city, two Japanese were killed and one seriously injured. The section crew were on a hand car going down grade and around a curve, and were met by a freight train drawn by two engines.

For a Cable to Alaska.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—A bill was introduced in the senate today by Senator Foster authorizing the construction of a cable by the government from some port on the coast of the state of Washington to Cape Nome and other points in Alaska.

LONDON, March 13.—General French sends reports for reinforcements, stating that it is impossible to take Bloemfontein without a larger force. The fighting continues.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—Reports just received state that the plague situation in Honolulu is better than for months.

DURHAM, March 13.—Gen. White arrived today and boarded the transport going to London.

LONDON, March 12.—Kruger asks powers for intervention. Congress at Washington is considering the matter.

TILLAMOOK, March 12.—The Schooner Lillie and Mamie was blown on Tillamook bar while trying to leave the bay, causing a total loss.

The dispatch from Cape Town saying that General French has arrived at Bloemfontein, probably does not mean that he has entered.

The Bill Passed.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The last legislative step in the enactment of the financial bill was taken by the House of Representatives today when the conference report on the bill was adopted by a vote of yeas, 166; nays, 120; present and not voting, 10. The senate had already adopted the conference report, so that it only remains for the President to affix his signature to the measure to make it a law.
