CIRCUIT COURT.

P. G. Morris Sentenced to Four Years in Penitentiary.

Pursuant to adjournment department No. 1 of Circuit Court was called to order at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

In the case of the State vs. P. G. Morris, H. H. Hewitt, attorney for the defendant, announced that no motion for a new trial had been filed. The first case was continued. Ten days were granted the defendant's attorneys to file bill of exceptions.

The defendant was sentenced to four years imprisonment in the state penitentiary, and to pay a fine of \$3131.08 or imprisonment for 1555.64 days in the county jail of Linn county.

The sentence means a total imprisonment of 8 years unless the fine is paid. The defendant was accompanied by his sister when the sentence was rendered. He was anxious to begin the service of it as soon as possible so long as it was before him, and the sheriff took him to Salem on the afternoon train.

It is an interesting fact that the sentence to the penitentiary is the same as the number of years he served the county as treasurer.

The case will probably be appealed. William Preston, an old soldier, was admitted to citizenship upon motion of A. A. Tussing.

Cannon apt Meiner. Settled. In the California Powder Works apt W. E. Chandler the demurer to the answer was overruled and proceedings stayed.

Found Dead.

A Lebanon dispatch says that word reached that city yesterday afternoon that John T. Settle was found dead about 8 o'clock at morning in a cabin on Wiley Creek, about five miles above Sweet Home, by Peter Hensley, a neighbor, who called to see him. Mr. Settle of late had been living alone in a cabin on the creek, and had been complaining of not feeling well, but was not thought to be at all seriously sick. He was about 60 years old. The County Judge telephoned out to J. Shea to go up and investigate the matter and report if he thought there was any foul play. If so he would send the coroner up to hold an inquest. There is not much doubt that death was from natural causes.

A GOOD DAYS WORK.

The people of Albany were brought close to Albany college yesterday by the part they took in placing it on a financial basis in keeping with its importance as an educational institution, entirely free from debt, a splendid starter for a condition of affairs that shall end in a permanent endowment.

The consummation of the work of the day was a grand mass meeting in the circuit room packed with an enthusiastic crowd of citizens, including college students with their yells.

It was a gala night in the history of the institution, which through many years has proven such an upholder of our educational and moral interests.

The Albany Concert Band played. D. P. Mason, president of the board of trustees introduced Rev. E. P. Hill of Portland, to whom more than any one else the result of the day is due, who delivered a short address, emphasizing the significance of the enthusiasm displayed during the day.

Then the subscription books were called for and read according to districts, with cheers according to the size of the subscription, culminating in music by the band and college yells when the total of \$3754.10, \$1254.10 more was asked for, was read. Since increased to \$3762.82 on account of an error.

Then Dr. Hill proceeded with deserved compliments for President Lee, and Rev. Reed, P. A. Young, F. J. Miller and others who had done so much fine work in raising the required amount.

President Mason of the board spoke for the men who had guaranteed the interest for three years, to-wit: W. H. Corbett, Mr. Ladd, W. L. Vance, N. H. Allen, M. Sternberg, Mr. Cummings, W. H. Goltz, Wm. Faber, Chas. Pfeiffer, S. E. Young, Dr. E. P. Hill, Judge Wolverton and D. P. Mason.

Judge Flinn, Rev. H. L. Reed, President Lee, Prof. Torbet, Prof. Walker, F. J. Miller, and P. A. Young, were called upon and spoke on different lines, on an occasion like this the short speeches being the most practical.

The meeting closed with the singing of the doxology and benediction by Rev. Hill. Notes.—\$229 from the students unsolicited was a good index of the splendid make up of the student body. Among the last subscriptions were one of \$25 from Attorney General Blackburn and \$50 from Chief Justice Wolverton by telephone. In the work of the day Rev. Hill was the power behind the throne in the organization for the work; but he was splendidly backed up.
