BRYAN IN ALBANY.

W. J. Bryan, Next President of the United States, Arrived in Albany at 8:30 o'clock on the delayed overland. He was greeted by a large crowd at the depot and received a warm reception at the Revere House, where he was taken. He presented the same appearance as four years ago. The Democrat man could not notice that time was dealing unfairly with him. His splendid physical make-up and excellent health are taking him through campaigns without a break to his health.

An immense crowd was present to greet him, people coming from all parts of the county regardless of the muddy roads, and as well from the adjoining towns on the lines of the different roads, a big train load coming from Lebanon, quite a number last night from the front, and a packed train this forenoon from the Bay.

At 10 o'clock, headed by the band, Mr. Bryan was taken to a platform on the west side of the court house with a long procession of people in charge of Col. Montague as marshal of the day, where he spoke to an audience of at least seven thousand people. The half block and adjoining streets were covered. A gentleman familiar with large crowds puts the number at between seven and ten thousand people.

The speaker was introduced by Hon. J. K. Weatherford as the next president of the United States. Mr. Bryan spoke for two hours and of course his speech cannot be given. In a masterly and unanswerable way he treated of the subjects: man first the dollar next, republicanism, the national banking system, prosperity, militarism, imperialism and expansion, the Porto Rican bill and our new possessions, holding the closest attention of the large audience. His reference to the toboggan slide of the republican party from Lincoln to Hanna was illustrative of the manner in which the republicans had descended to their present policy of placing man second to the dollar. The arraignment of the republicans on the trust question was complete. The only argument of the republican party today is "prosperity," and this was explained in a live manner. Imperialism is what he opposes not expansion, and that the republican party is becoming imperialistic was forcibly stated, and the tendency of the party is illustrated in their sympathy for England against a struggling republic. He would give the Filipinos their independence and then protect them against the world.

Accompanied by several Albany men Col. Bryan was taken in a special train to Salem, where he spoke at 1:30 o'clock. There was not much gingerbread or display about the affair, but it was a great success made so by the large audience and the splendid speech delivered.

AFTER NINE YEARS—The remains of Thomas Tucker were found yesterday at the head of Rock Creek, where they had been nine years. Tucker was lost in a storm and his body was never found until now. A gun beside the bones revealed their identity. Coroner Norman was notified, but very properly notified these bones in charge that there was no occasion for an inquest, and to give the remains a burial as desired.

Plans have been drawn by Mr. C. H. Bergner for the new Christian church, which shows a very handsome structure. It will cover 60x90 feet and will be very conveniently arranged in modern style. The seating capacity will be about 800.

The Salem Statesman gives an account of the manner in which Linn county men have been worked by swindlers, bunco men, etc. Some of the cases referred to are as old as the hills and have almost been forgotten.

The middle of the road popo-republican party will hold a congressional convention in Albany on April 11, under charge of S. H. Holt.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Present—Mayor, recorder, chief of police, street superintendent and all councilmen.

The following bills were ordered paid: J. K. Davis, \$3.00; J. S. Van Winkle, \$15.70; Albany Herald, \$25.25.

The committee on fire and water reported that the cistern at Montgomery and 1st streets was holding water all right and moved that the bill be paid. Ayes and no's called for: Aye, Dannels, Ralston, and Pfeiffer; no, Richard, Seely, Whitney. The mayor voted yes and the motion was declared carried.

A nuisance was reported in block 8, eastern addition.

Two special policemen were reported for March 28.

Petition of J. S. Lamer et al asked for sewer across block 129 and block 129 H's ad. Granted.

Mr. Bristol representing the holders of the warrants issued to the King Bridge Co. spoke in reference to the amount, of \$6718.48 due on the warrants, in which he claimed as a basis of settlement the warrants next in order of payment. Mr. Ralston reported that Mr. Mason offered to take a warrant for the amount at 4 per cent discount. Upon motion referred to the committee on ways and means with power to act. Reconsidered and lost.

Upon motion the recorder was directed to correspond in reference to securing a loan.

Mr. Weatherford reported that there was no contract between the city and county in reference to the bridge, and that the city could not hold the county under it, that the city must keep up the bridge if able to do so, and that whether responsible for damage or not will depend on whether there is an actual barrier or knowledge of notice of non-responsibility.

A nuisance was reported near Madison St. sewer. The committee was directed to look after it.

Property owners across the street and on Second street, also opposite council chambers, were directed to repair the same within five days.

The street commissioner was directed to connect the cistern at First and Montgomery streets with the ditch.

A warrant for \$2250 was ordered drawn on account of interest on bonds.
