THE CONVENTIONS.

DEMOCRATIC.
The convention was called to order by W. R. Bilyeu, chairman of the central committee. J. K. Weatherford was unanimously elected chairman. After a few remarks, to the point, business was begun at once.

P. J. Smiley was elected secretary and M. Sanders assistant.

Committees were appointed as follows: Credentials—H. W. McElmurry, W. R. Bilyeu, C. J. Sheld, T. P. McKnight, E. O. Stenard.

Order of Business—M. A. Miller, Dr. Henry, F. M. Smith, M. W. Carter, E. J. Sealey.

Permanent Organization—W. R. Bilyeu, C. H. Stewart, Peter Bither.

The committee on credentials reported those entitled to seats, only a few being by proxy.

The temporary officers were made the permanent officers.

The following order of business was adopted:

1. Election of permanent officers.

2. Selection of conference committee of five to meet with the people's party committee.

3. Election of 14 delegates to state convention.

4. Selection of county central committee.

D. Clifford moved that the provision of a conference be stricken out but there was no second, thereupon he left the convention.

The following resolutions were adopted upon motion of M. A. Miller:

Resolved, That the democratic party of Lincoln county in convention assembled hereby express their sympathy for the Boers in their gallant struggle for liberty.

Resolved, That we hereby reaffirm our adherence to the Chicago platform adopted by the democratic national committee.

That we most heartily endorse our able and fearless leader Hon. W. J. Bryna for president in 1900.

Further, that we are in favor of free and unrestricted trade with Porto Rico.

It was moved that a conference committee of five be elected by ballot. T. Minkens, C. J. Sheld, C. H. Stewart, F. M. Smith, J. H. Peery, Henry Lyons, C. J. Sheld, M. A. Miller, S. M. Garland, W. R. Bilyeu, A. J. McClure, S. S. Leeper, C. W. Richardson and W. H. Averill named.

Elected C. H. Stewart, C. J. Sheld, J. H. Peery, S. M. Garland, W. H. Averill.

The conference committee reported just before going to press as follows:

Democrats—Sheriff, Recorder, Assessor, superintendent and surveyor.

Peoples party—Judge, Clerk, Treasurer, Commissioner and Coroner.

Legislative ticket to be one each for democrats, populists and silver republicans.

At press time the democrats were electing delegates to the state convention and the populists preparing to make their nominations.

For recorder Ed Meeker.

For assessor T. J. Anderson.

For representative Mark Peery.

For surveyor T. A. Riggs.

PEOPLE'S PARTY.

The convention was held at the court house. It was called to order by Hon. H. M. Palmer, chairman of the central committee. C. C. Hogue was elected chairman and T. L. Dugger secretary.

T. J. McCleary, A. Blevins, C. B. Montague, John Smallmon and Volney Robinson were appointed a credential committee.

While the committee were preparing their report the good of the coming campaign was discussed all looking toward harmony.

B. F. Ramp was appointed a committee of one to confer with the democratic convention on the number to compose the conference committee.

The committee on credentials reported.

The temporary officers were made permanent. W. F. Hammer was elected assistant secretary.
