Held for Cattle Stealing.

Ben Mills, a young man residing near Lebanon, after examination last night before Justice Nutting was held in \$300 bonds to appear in the next circuit court. J. J. Whitney appeared for the state and L. M. Curl for the defendant. Four witnesses testified for the state, presenting an interesting case. According to the testimony of John Craft and Enoch Ridgeway, who resides with Craft, they were awakened about 10:30 o'clock at night on March 18 by the barking of Craft's dog. Craft went in his night clothes out doors to the front fence and saw the defendant, whom he recognized, passing with six yearlings, while Ridgeway looked from a window. After he had passed Craft dressed, believing that his own or some one else's cattle had been taken, got on his horse and followed, catching up with the man driving the cattle about a mile from his house. The young man on seeing that he was pursued left the cattle and fled followed by Craft for three quarters of a mile, getting away from him. Craft returned, called up W. H. South and the animals were placed in Craft's field, where they were identified by W. C. Miller as belonging to his son W. W. Miller, from whose place they had been taken. The defendant offered no evidence in defence.
