Meteorological Table.

Through the politeness of Professor S. P. Barrett, we are enabled to lay before our readers the following table showing the range of the Mercury for the week ending May 31st, 1873, at Baker City, Oregon:

Table with 3 columns: Day, 7 A. M., 12 M., 10 P. M. Rows for Sunday through Saturday.

Average for the week 47.6 degrees above Zero. Average for the month 50.3.

Highest point recorded for May 31 degrees on the evening. Lowest point, 32 degrees on the evening of the 21st and the morning of the 30th.

It rained a fair shower on the 16th, 18th, 20th and 26th of the month.

It snowed a little every few days for the last part of the month. Wind blew hard all day on the 15th, 16th, 22d and 23d. Gentle breezes occasionally during the month. It has been unusually cold; frosts and freezes killing corn, potatoes and early vegetables.

BEAUTIFUL RESIDENCE.—Last week we gave a short description of Dr. Boyd's residence—this week we shall notice that of Judge Sterns, which is situated in Fisher's addition to Baker City, the east. It is one and a half stories high, contains some seven or eight rooms including all the modern improvements.
