OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, June 10th, 1873.
The Centennial Celebration.

Many of the most distinguished men in the country whom I have met here lately, including two of the most patriotic and far-seeing members of the Centennial Commission, are afraid that the celebration of the nation's hundredth anniversary in 1876, at Philadelphia, will fail to make a desirable impression upon visitors from Europe, if the president persists in converting the whole affair into a political machine for promoting his own personal ends and those of his supporters for a third term. If

Only one half of the People are represented on the Commission, the celebration can not, in any true sense of the word, be called national and will not be so regarded, either by unrepresented Americans or by foreigners. To secure the hearty sympathy of the masses, the aid of capitalists, the co-operation of the country, the presence of a large number of foreign exhibitors and visitors and the attention and respect of the governments and peoples of the entire civilized world—to secure these essentials to success, the American press must declare at the start, and emphatically, that it will not recognize

A "National" Celebration to be engineered for Party Purposes.

If there is one thing more than another that the American people wish, or ought to wish, to impress upon the world, it is the possibility of men and women of the most opposite views on religious, moral, social, and political questions—men and women of different races and various kinds and degrees of culture, including the entirely uneducated and the often fearfully mis-educated—living under the same government in comparative harmony, simply by agreeing to submit, and by quietly submitting, for stated periods, to the arbitrament of a fairly ascertained majority; and nothing would exemplify this more markedly to foreigners than a "pro rata" representation on the Commission of naturalized citizens of all nationalities, and of citizens native and adopted, of all religious and political views, including even those who entertain strong individual convictions antagonistic to those of a majority of their fellow citizens and who hanker after extreme political and social changes unattainable in the present stage of human progress but who recognize, nevertheless, the fact that, all things considered, a man can come nearer doing as he pleases, under our form of government, provided always that he does not infringe on the rights of others, than under any other that has ever existed beyond the confines of the brain that conceived it.

The Vienna Scandal.

causes a good deal of annoyance to Americans who propose to pass the summer in Europe. No one pretends to know the truth of the matter; but the fact that men appointed to honorable positions by the president, and so thrust, as representative Americans, into the society of European gentlemen, are even accused by cooks and tapsters of swindling them, must necessarily be mortifying to American travelers in Europe. It is these repeated blunders of the president in his appointments that cause thoughtful men to doubt the success of the centennial celebration.

The Congressional Printer.

Alman M. Clapp, has been rendered uneasy for some time by well founded rumors that Senators Cameron and Scott of Pennsylvania have decided to give his place to a Pennsylvania printer. The Congressional printer, as you are aware, is elected by the Senate, and has charge of the Government Printing Office. About the first act of Reuben E. Fenton, Senator from New York, after he took his seat in the Senate, in 1869, was to get up a combination in that body to oust John D. Defrees from the position of Congressional printer, and give it to his friend Clapp, who now holds it. Besides helping Clapp, Fenton also revenged himself on Defrees, but for whose successful strategy in Chicago, in '68, in favor of Colfax, Fenton would have most certainly been nominated for the Vice Presidency. Fenton is now, however, a dead cock in the pit, and the administration men make it a religious duty to "go for" every officeholder appointed on his recommendation. There is no doubt that the Senate will allow Cameron to name Clapp's successor, in consideration of the decisive majority that Pennsylvania gave for Grant last November. In the mean time, Clapp is very nervous, and is running round to procure certificates of his loyalty to the administration.

Enlargement of the Washington "Chronicle."

The Daily Chronicle has been enlarged to eight pages, and makes a handsome appearance. By the by, the Chronicle contained, a few days ago, a carefully written editorial, defining the words "capital" and "labor," and showing the existing relations to each other. The writer explained, with unusual clearness, that little permanent evil can result from the concentration of wealth in the hands of private individuals, because when they die, it is re-distributed, but that the steady accumulation of wealth by corporations, which never die; is fraught with actual danger to the liberties of the people; and that it is against these corporations that the war must be waged by labor. I was led to believe, and the article in question intimated, that the Chronicle would contain future editorials in the same vein, but none have appeared thus far. I have been informed that "influential friends of the paper," that is, officers of wealthy corporations of which, until recently, the principal stockholder in the Chronicle was the confidential senate chamber attorney, decided that the first article of the promised series was revolutionary, communistic, inflammatory, &c., and demanded and secured the suppression of those that were to follow.
