OUR STONE BUILDINGS.—We are pleased to see the progress made in the erection of these buildings. As course upon course of the splendid cut stone is raised, the designs of the architect and builder begin to be developed.

These buildings are surely the finest cut stone buildings for business houses in the State of Oregon. Some of our people who had known Mr. Roberts only as a horticulturist were at first in doubts about his skill as a stone cutter and builder, but this evidence of his skill places him beyond no doubt as a master workman, and worthy the confidence of those who may contemplate erecting beautiful and substantial buildings. No further recommendation could be needed. It will be well for Baker City if sufficient patronage can be offered to retain him here.

These buildings will be finished in about three weeks, when Mr. J. W. Vayne (who owns the two in the north side) will move his bank in the corner; S. Ottenheimer the other next south; and Messrs. Bamberger & Frank into Messrs. Roberts & Nelson's building, which is the lower story of the Odd Fellows Hall.

The Masonic Hall will occupy the middle room above, and the north room will be divided and rented for offices.

We hear of other stone buildings being contemplated and hope soon to see Baker built up of substantial stone or brick fire proof buildings.
