LATE NEWS.

SAN DIEGO, June 2.—The Union's Tucson correspondent says letters have been just received from Camp Apache, saying that Lieut. Babcock with some troops was sent out after the San Carlos Indians who killed Lieut. Army. They overtook them in the mountains, compelled them to an engagement, and killed fourteen and took six prisoners.

A letter from Alter, Mexico, says the Indians are running off stock. A gentleman who arrived to-day from the Pimo Villages, Arizona, says that on the 24th of June, a Mexican who had been selling liquor to Indians, killed a chief's son in a quarrel.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The law abolishing the franking privilege having gone into effect to-day, several of the Departments have detailed men especially to attach stamps to official documents all of which have to be previously weighed.

HARTFORD, Conn., July 1.—The House to-day passed a resolution declaring the increased pay of Congressmen unnecessary, and requesting Senators and Representatives to labor for the repeal of the law.

FORT KALAMATH, July 3.—The Commission for the trial of Captain Jack and other Modocs accessory to the murder of citizens and implicated in the assassination of the Peace Commissioners will convene on the 5th inst.

SAN DIEGO, July 7.—The Union has Tucson dates to July 1st. A Sergeant, from San Carlos, brought information to camp Grant that Eskivanzin and a large number of Apaches at San Carlos robbed the Sntler's store, and had taken the war path in the mountains.

ST. LOUIS, July 5.—A special from Hannibal, Mo., says the severest storm that ever visited that section broke over Hannibal last night. Two or three houses were blown down, several unroofed and much damage done to fences, etc.
