asking information of the life or
death of the persons named in it,

the city in comfort. On their jour-
ney, however, both parents were at-

destination. The confusion and un-

attention to such a matter it might
otherwise have received; the bodies
were taken ashore at some station by
night and hurriedly interred, and

ing for the family. But no such
friend existed.

At the end of the voyage the hap-
less situation of the child was re-
vealed, and as a passenger going to
Indiana offered to take her with him

Southern relations could be in-
formed, no one opposed the opportune
adoption. For adoption it was. The
gentleman took his bereaved, bewil-
dered charge to Evansville, where
his family warmly welcomed and
harbored her, and as letters to her
family name in New Orleans evoked
no replies, and the war on the Mis-
sissippi waxed hotter, the young ex-
ile was finally looked upon as a per-
manent addition to the household.

How it happened that her Southern
relations were not traced after the
advent of peace is not explained.—
The story simply speaks of her as
growing to young womanhood in In-
diana, and being regarded as a mem-
ber of her benefactor's family there
until a fortnight ago, when a local
journal mentioned the appearance in
New Orleans papers of an advertise-
ment calling for information respect-
ing a person of her former name.

Never having forgotten the latter,
she wrote secretly to the address
given in the call, avowing herself its
proper bearer, relating the circum-
stances of her Western domestication,
and is now able to announce
herself to her Evansville friends as
heirress to a legacy of \$56,000, which
has been bequeathed to her parents
or herself by a lately departed sister
of her mother in the Crescent City.
Her adopted parents are taking mea-

her by the proper means of identifi-
cation, and a marriage in which a
son of theirs will be the bridegroom
is likely to crown the romance with
poetic justice.

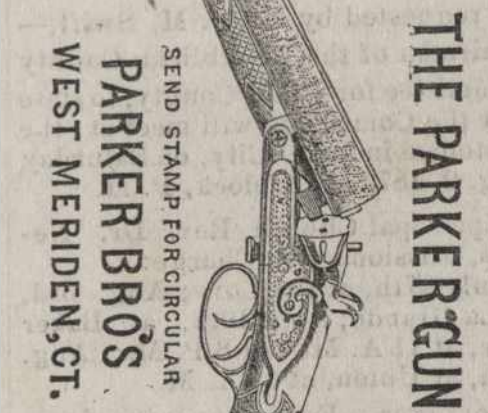

baldness often,
though not
always, cured
by its use.
Nothing can
restore the hair
where the fol-
licles are de-
stroyed, or
the glands at-
rophied and
decayed; but
such as remain
can be saved
by this applica-
tion, and stim-
ulated into
activity, so that
a new growth
of hair is pro-
duced. Instead
of fouling the
hair with a
pasty sediment,
it will keep it
clean and vigor-
ous. Its occa-
sional use will
present the hair
from turning
gray or falling
