The weather was quite warm during the month of July, but the middle of the month being cool, the average temperature was much reduced. Warmest day at noon, July 19th, the mercury stood at 86 degrees, coolest day, in morning, July 4th, mercury stood at 46 degrees.

The residence of Rev. Mr. Wells, of Walla Walla, was burned on last Wednesday. Loss—building \$3,000 and furniture, money and clothing about \$3,500.

It has been very hot and dry for the past two weeks and the roads are becoming very dusty and disagreeable for traveling.

GAME.—Duck, Sagehen and Prairie-chicken are plenty in our market; once in a while we see a goose on sale.

MADRID, July 31.—The Revolutionary Junta at Granada has issued a decree directing the seizure of property belonging to the State, including churches, convents and bell foundries. The last mentioned is done in order to obtain metal for coinage.

The Insurgent Junta at Seville also issued a decree ordering a reduction of fifty per cent in leases and rents, and a similar reduction in the necessities of life, closing factories, and making a division among the people of uncultivated land.

A later despatch received by the Minister of War announces that the insurrection in Seville has been stopped, and the city is now occupied by Government troops. The fires started by the insurgents has been extinguished.

LISBON, July 31.—The Spanish frigate Villa de Madrid, at Cadiz, joined the insurgents to day, and opened fire upon the arsenal.

BATONNE, July 31.—Don Carlos has entered Biscay.

LONDON, July 31.—The great race for the Goodwood cup took place to-day, and was won by "Flageolet," "Favonius," second, "Cremorne" third. No other horses ran. The betting at the start was six to four against "Flageolet," five to four against "Favonius," and four to one against "Cremorne."

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The trial of Austin, Bidwell and accomplices in the frauds upon the bank of England, will take place on the 18th inst. It is rumored that the accused will plead guilty.

A railroad tunnel has just been completed under the city of Baltimore, which is 7,519 feet long. It was commenced on the 1st of June, 1871, and was pushed to completion with all the characteristic vigor and energy of the Pennsylvania Central Railroad Company, for whose use it is constructed, as by means of it the P. C. R. R. makes connections with several Southern railroads. The cost of this tunnel, the largest in the country except the Hoosac, is about \$2,500,000.

Daniel Boone's rifle, shotpouch, powder horn, hunting knife, and a section of a beech log on which he cut his name and date, 1774, are in the public library at Louisville, Kentucky. The wooden stopper of the powder horn still bears the mark of his teeth.

An Atlanta doctor advises persons afraid of cholera to stand on their head for one minute three times a day. He argues that this arrests abdominal depression, and would be a healthful gymnastic exercise at any time.

John Taber, one of the editorial staff of the New Orleans Republican, recently died of a chronic disease.—In a personal altercation he killed the father of Josie Mansfield, in California.

W. W. Baker's residence, at La Grande, was destroyed by fire on last Friday. Loss estimated at about \$2,500. The fire, it is supposed, originated from a defective flue.
