Patton, Grand Master of Masons in Oregon—Sir: It is the wish of the Board of the State Capitol Building Commissioners that the corner-stone Capitol Building be laid with appropriate ceremonies, on the 8th of October next, and they respectfully request the Grand Lodge of Masons of Oregon to perform the ceremony, after the tradition of their Order.

The M. W. Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of the State of Oregon will convene in Special Grand Communication at Salem on the 8th of October, for the purpose set forth in the foregoing correspondence.

The ceremonies of laying the corner-stone will take place on the Capitol grounds at one p. m. on the 8th of October, and will be preceded by a procession of the members of the Masonic Fraternity under the direction of the Grand Marshal.

The invitation having been accepted of laying the stone by the Grand Lodge of Masons, the officers of this body are perfecting the necessary arrangements, and no pains will be spared in making the ceremonies grand and imposing.

The following named persons are appointed a Committee of Arrangements: B. F. Brown, W. C. Warren, D. Payton, D. H. Murphy, J. Babcock, and J. B. Lee, of Corvallis, has been chosen to act as Grand Marshal.

The oration is to be delivered by Hon. S. F. Chadwick, Secretary of State.

All Masons of other Jurisdictions, in good standing, are invited to be present.

The occasion will be one of great importance in the history of our State. The honor of laying the corner-stone has been tendered the Masonic Fraternity, and it is to be hoped that the Subordinate Lodges throughout the entire Jurisdiction will be fully represented, not only by their officers but by their members.
