

New York, Aug. 26.—The following dispatch is published this morning from the Yellowstone Expedition:

MUSSEL SHELL RIVER, Aug. 19. The abundant preparation made for the resistance of Indians has been fully justified. The prediction of Bloody Knife that we should meet savages in the vicinity of Tongue River, proved correct. Indians were discovered for the first time about Aug. 1st, watching our movements, and prowling about the camp at night. No overt act took place, however, until the 4th. Gen. Custar, with Bloody Knife, and a squadron of cavalry, had been detailed by Gen. Stanley to go on and look up the road. Having got about 10 miles ahead, they halted and picketed their horses in a wood by the river to wait for the train. Two hours afterwards six Indians appeared on the plain and made demonstrations toward their camp. Dismounting, a line of skirmishers were thrown out, and the horses were saddled.

The Indians were easily driven off, but they proved to be the decoy of a large party in the neighborhood waiting in ambush for the cavalry.—Finding the ruse had failed, Indians to the number of 300 boldly rode out and advanced on the grove occupied by the cavalry. Gen. Custar had only one squadron of 80 men, under command of Capt. Maylen. One of the troops was commanded by Lieut. Custar and the other by Lieut. Von Rum. The men were again dismounted and extended their line in a semi circle around the cavalry who had the river at their back. A rapid firing was kept up at a distance of 400 yards.

While thus engaged with General Custar in front, another party of Indians crawled along under the river bank and tried to stampede his horses, but were frustrated. The Indians fired the grass in several places, but failed to burn out the cavalry.—Gen. Custar deferred a charge, hoping that the main command would soon come up and assist in capturing the Indians. After three hours fighting, his ammunition gave out. He then charged the Indians, who precipitately fled dropping many of their equipments. After retreating several miles they took to the bad lands. One man slightly wounded in the arm and one horse wounded, formed the extent of Gen. Custar's loss.

While the fighting was going on, several Indians left the war party in search of stragglers. Coming upon Dr. Hensinger, Veterinary Surgeon, and Ballardine, a cavalry sutler, who were less than a mile from the column, they killed them and took their horses and valuables. Private Ball, while out hunting, met a similar fate. In the fight 2 Indians and several ponies were killed.

On the 8th of August, four days after the fight at Tongue River, we came upon the site of a recent Indian village. Gen. Stanley directed Custar to take his cavalry, numbering 450 men, and follow and punish the Indians. Custar left on the night of the 8th. At sundown of the 9th, after a march of 40 miles, he arrived at the place where the Indians had crossed the river 24 hours before,—taking over their families on rafts.—Next day he attempted to cross the Yellowstone, which at this point is 450 yards wide. The current was too swift and deep to swim horses and men, and the attempt to cross had to be abandoned for want of axes and rope.

At evening his camp was discovered by Indians, and next morning, August 11th, at daylight, was attacked by about 800 Indians. Firing was returned for two or three hours, both parties using trees as a cover. A party of 300 Indians then crossed the river above and below the camp and endeavored to gain the bluffs in our rear. Our men were dismounted and posted on the bluffs, and received them bravely. The Indians behind the ridges kept up a fire until Gen. Custar ordered a charge.—Our men then mounted and pursued them boldly for eight miles. Just at this time a train came up and opened on the Indians across the river with artillery. A few shots dispersed them and ended the fight.

This battle, which took place with in 2 miles of Big Horn, was a fierce one. Gen. Custar and Adj. Ketchard had their horses shot under them. Lieut. Cruden was badly shot in the thigh. Private Tuttle, Custar's orderly, was killed, and 20 of our soldiers were slightly wounded. We had 4 horses killed.

The Indians loss is estimated, by Custar, at 40 killed. The Indians were well armed with heavy rifles, and had abundant ammunition. They were mainly Uncapas, supposed to be under the command of Sitting Bull.

BATTLE MOUNTAIN, Aug. 25.—One ton of very rich ore from the Cornucopia mines was brought to this place today and will be sent below to be crushed.

Messrs. Clugage and Robertson,—of the Austin stage line, made the trip from Cornucopia to this place in sixteen hours with a buggy and two horses. They intend putting on a line of stages immediately.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 25.—Poles are being unloaded at National City, and already distributed between here and there, for the military telegraph. Building will commence on Thursday. It is expected building was commenced at Prescott this morning according to instructions.

KNOXVILLE, Aug. 24.—Judge T. R. Nelson, Judge of the Supreme court died at his residence here at six o'clock this morning, of cholera, after an illness of two days.

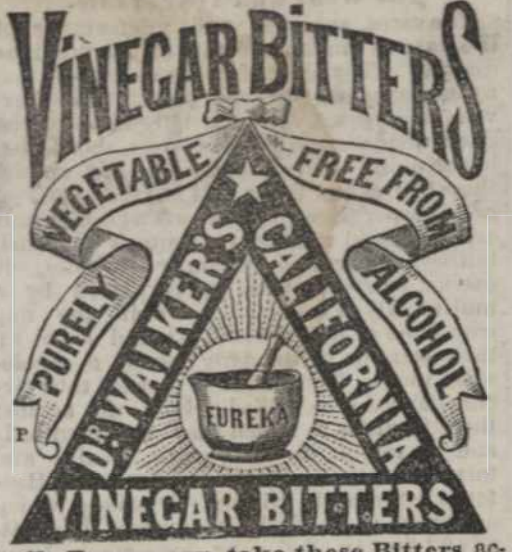

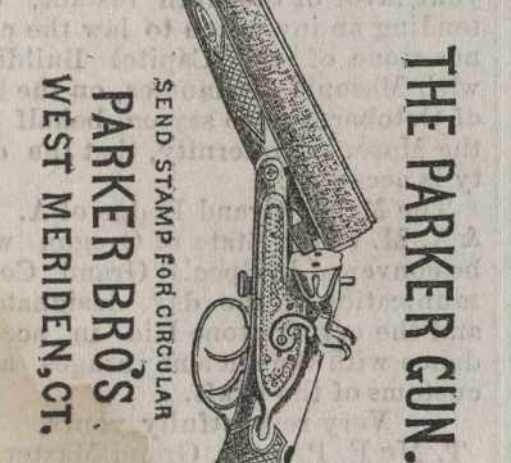
