A simple promise to speak the truth, complying with obligations contracted, with penalties in case of violation, is substituted for the religious oath. Nobody is obliged to give his or ber services without just compensation. No contract is to be permitted, which aims at a sacrifice of the liberty of man in matters of work, education and religious vows. Laws of this country do not recognize monastic orders, nor permit their establishment by any denomination, or under any pretense; and no contract will be allowed to be made among persons consenting to their own proscription or banishment.
