The above gives Nesmith 1716 ma-  
jority, with a report of a small ma-  
jority in Marion for Nesmith, and  
Josephine, Coos, Curry, Tillamook  
and Grant counties to hear from;  
which it is estimated will increase  
Nesmith's majority some 300, making  
his majority in the State over 2,000.

**Ohio and Pennsylvania.**  
By a telegraphic dispatch to R. H.  
Cardwell, Wells Fargo & Co's Agent  
at this city we learn that Ohio has  
elected the Democratic Governor and  
the legislature, and that Pennsylva-  
nia has gone Republican.

**NEWS SUMMARY.**

We make up the following from  
the Sacramento Union of Oct. 11th:

At the court-martial which is try-  
ing the French General Bazaine it  
was ascertained on the 10th inst that  
Metz contained 17,000,000 cartridges  
and that Bazaine had used only  
1,000,000; though he officially re-  
ported that he had no ammunition.

The International Judicial Con-  
gress opened its sessions at Brussels  
yesterday. D. Dudley Field was  
present, and letters were received  
from the King of Belgium and Count  
Sclopis, of Italy, late one of the Ge-  
neva Court of Arbitrators in the Ala-  
bama case.

Count Marise de Fluvry, the ce-  
lebrated French politician, is dead.

The Count de Chambord has taken  
up his residence two miles from Ge-  
neva.

One hundred Republicans of the  
French Assembly met at Paris yester-  
day and drew up a plan of politi-  
cal action. Thiers and Gambetta  
both approve it and all are working  
together.

Receipts of Gold Coin at the Wash-  
ington and New York Treasury De-  
partments were \$10,000,000 during  
the month of October. Only \$20  
pieces were coined.

Father Matthew's birthday was  
celebrated by the Catholics of Bos-  
ton yesterday.

Alfred Cummings, who was Gov-  
ernor of Utah during Buchanan's  
presidency, died near Atlanta, Ga.,  
yesterday.

Yellow fever is still at Montgome-  
ry, Ala.

A fearful cyclone swept over Key  
West and Punta Rosa (Florida) yester-  
day. The wind blew at the rate  
of ninety miles an hour, and swept  
the sea fourteen feet above tide level.

Buddington, Dr. Bissell and others  
of the Polaris, will be examined at  
the Washington Navy Yard to-day  
as to the death of Captain Hall and  
the loss of the vessel.

Three professors in the South Car-  
olina University have resigned be-  
cause a colored student has been ad-  
mitted.

Santanta and Big Tree have been  
released by the Governor of Texas  
on the singular condition that if the  
Kiowas or any other Indians hereaf-  
ter raid on Texas, then these two  
Kiowa chiefs are to be rearrested.

California this year produces 1,000  
bales of cotton.

It is estimated that the Stockton  
and Visalia road—175 miles long—  
will cost \$1,973,166; or an average  
of \$11,223.75 per mile. A western  
line surveyed makes the distance  
eleven miles less, and the aggregate  
cost less by \$100,000.

On the 16th inst. the Emperor of  
Germany will visit the Emperor of  
Austria at Vienna.

A railway from Bombay to Madras  
in India, is just completed.

The report of a Carlist victory  
over the Republicans at Cirauqui, is  
contradicted. The victory was the  
other way. The Carlists were defeat-  
ed with heavy loss.

We make up the following from  
the Sacramento Union of October  
13th:

Rumor in Madrid says a conspira-  
cy has been discovered to assassinate  
President Castelar.

A fight took place at Carthagena  
on Saturday between the Republi-  
cans and insurgents in that city.

Marshal Bazaine's trial is progres-  
sing without any more favorable in-  
dications of his acquittal.

Rouher is to call the Imperial As-  
semblymen together to consider the  
terms of a compromise with the Mo-  
narchists. Thiers will firmly adhere  
to the republic, but he declines to  
enter into any cabal with Gambetta  
or the extreme left.

The Republicans have carried three  
out of the four departments of  
France, where elections were held  
yesterday to fill vacancies in the As-  
sembly. The Monarchists were de-  
feated everywhere.

The insurgents in Cuba have re-  
cently gained a victory over the  
Government troops.

Considerable loss of life and prop-  
erty has resulted from the late storm  
in Havana.

Under the amendments of the  
Constitution of Mexico, adopted  
Sept. 25th, 1873, marriage is a civil  
contract, to be solemnized by the  
civil magistrate. The religious oath  
is abolished. Religious institutions  
cannot hold property. Monastic  
orders are prohibited. The Church  
and State are separated completely.

President Grant favors the country  
with his views on the late financial  
crisis. He thinks it will be an ad-  
vantage to the country and hasten  
the resumption of specie payments.

He believes that it will make room  
for many millions of silver as a cir-  
culating medium, and that silver is  
the currency that will and ought to  
be substituted for fractional notes.

He recommends free banking, a gold  
reserve fund, and a law for the is-  
sue of the \$44,000,000 reserve.

President Grant thinks now that  
he will recommend in his annual  
message a postoffice bank, the depos-  
itors to draw 4 per cent on their de-  
posits and to be secured by 4 1/2  
per cent United States bonds, an equal  
amount of outstanding 6 per cents  
to be taken up.

Grant says he will consult the will  
of the country generally in his ap-  
pointment of a Chief Justice.

Seven deaths yesterday at Shreve-  
port by yellow fever. Forty five  
deaths yesterday at Memphis by yel-  
low fever, against 32 on Saturday.—  
All the societies call for assistance  
from abroad.

The Evangelical Alliance held  
meetings at four places in New York  
yesterday, and these were the closing  
services of the Alliance.

Captain Buddington's testimony  
puts a phase on the matters con-  
nected with the Polaris expedition dif-  
ferent from that presented by the Ty-  
son party.

Intelligence from the East intima-  
tes that Thomas Scott has succeed-  
ed in negotiating bonds in Europe  
in behalf of his Texas and Pacific R.  
R.

The Rockford, Rock Island and  
St. Louis R. R. Co. charge H. H.  
Body, their former Treasurer and Di-  
rector, with fraudulently retaining  
\$245,000, and with a secret partner-  
ship in the company.

Senator Pomeroy was shot Oct. 11  
in Washington by ex Representative  
Conway of Kansas, but only slightly  
wounded, for alleged ruin of himself  
and family.

There has been a fire in Detroit—  
loss \$50,000; insurance small.

The large stables of Martin Hay &  
Cosner in Boston were burned Oct.  
11th, with 86 horses, valued at from  
\$300 to \$1,000 each.

The telegraph wires are now up  
and working from San Diego to Ma-  
ricopa Wells.

**LATE NEWS.**

**CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 2.** Two priests  
of the church of St. Loreto have ex-  
communicated all who recognize the  
Constitution and reforms instituted  
by the Government. The Jesuits  
have been ordered to leave the coun-  
try at their first opportunity.

The President issued a decree on  
the day following the publication of  
the reforms and additions to the Con-  
stitution, proclaimed on the 25th ult.,  
commanding all functionaries and  
Government employes to affirm with-  
out reservation the reforms, and to  
guard and cause to be guarded all  
additions, under penalty of a for-  
feiture of their positions in Congress,  
and decreed the following: Church  
and State shall be separate. Con-  
gress cannot make laws establishing  
or prohibiting any religion. Matrim-  
ony is to be a civil contract. Reli-  
gious institutions cannot possess  
property. A simple promise to speak  
the truth, complying with obligations  
contracted, with penalties in case of  
violation, is substituted for the reli-  
gious oath. Nobody is obliged to  
give his or her services without just  
compensation. No contract is to be  
permitted, which aims at a sacrifice  
of the liberty of man in matters of  
work, education and religious vows.

Laws of
