

LATE NEWS.

Chicago, Oct. 24.—About \$65,000 in silver coin was brought to this city to-day by Adams' Express from the Philadelphia mint, consigned to one of our National Banks and a firm of private bankers, who are paying it out at par. The bullion from which it was coined was from the Ore Smelting and Refinery Works in this city, which is producing about \$200,000 worth monthly, and all of which it will continue to have coined for circulation.

New York, Oct. 25.—The specie shipments to-day consisted of \$239,216 in silver bars and \$12,000 in gold bars. There is no bank statement to-day. A Washington dispatch says the amount of silver to be put out next week, will be between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000, and should the demand exceed this, the Secretary will issue more.

Washington, Oct. 25.—The Secretary of Treasury, relative to the contemplated issue of silver coin in place of currency in making payments by the Department, says he does not know exactly how much will be paid out, but expects it will be convenient for him next week to issue about \$200,000 in the regular course of business, but that this will depend somewhat on circumstances. If gold should go up silver would not be paid out, nor would it be if it was to be sold again to bankers for speculative purposes.

Albany, Oct. 26.—Yesterday two men, named respectively Van Emerson and Shirtz, got into a quarrel over a shooting match at the Buckhead saloon, in Sweethome Valley, 25 miles east of this city, which resulted in the death of both parties. Van Emerson stabbed Shirtz in the breast, killing him, whereas one of Shirtz's brothers struck Van Emerson on the back of the neck breaking the same and causing instant death. The sheriff is in pursuit of the murderer.

Forty ex-slaves of South Carolina recently formed themselves into a religious sect, led by a female who proscribed that they should have wings, and be led into a land flowing with milk and honey. They started north, and on the way killed and ate one of their party. This being discovered, the whole gang was arrested. They are now in jail awaiting the growth of their wings, and the prospect is fair for their finding a land that never was promised to them.

The Benicia "Boy" Dying.—The Baltimore Gazette has this tribute to a prominent sport of other days:—"John C. Heenan, the prize fighter, is reported as fatally ill of hemorrhage of the lungs in Montana Territory, whither he had gone for his health. Those who believe that athletes are generally long lived, may well think of this man. A more splendid specimen of physical power never existed. To judge from his appearance, he might have died at a hundred. It seemed almost impossible that disease could undermine and overthrow that vigorous and sinewy frame. Still, like so many of those who train for the ring, he was overtaxed. The muscles were sound, the flesh firm, the body rounded and unimpaired, but in these cases the internal organs, are sure to feel the strain, the wear and tear of such a life. In Heenan it was the lungs, and the man is dying—a very Hercules, a magnificent wreck."
