SUMMER MINE.—We noticed quite a stir on the streets, a day or two since—wagons loaded with chinamen and their provisions. By enquiry we found that Mr. Alex. Stewart, the Superintendent of the Summit Mine, owned by Packwood & Stewart, at Hogen, is increasing the working force of that mine. We understand he has contracted with these men to work therein until the first of next June at \$1.75 per day—they agreeing to lay on the dump not less than one ton per day to the man, or to be paid in proportion to the amount of quartz taken out. Messrs. Packwood and Stewart have always taken an active part in developing the resources of the country, and are, we hope, justly rewarded. If others that have the means would take hold in the same spirit, or even lend a helping hand, it is in our opinion that very little outside capital would be required to develop the immense mineral fields that we have in Grant, Union and Baker counties, and with profit to the employer and the employee. We have the mines, and under contracts of the kind made by Mr. Stewart, the owners of them would run but little risk.
