

Board of Equalization.

The Portland Daily News, in speaking of the State Board of Equalization says:

"Republican and certain Democratic newspapers are engaged in an effort, each to make the party of the other responsible for the passage of the act creating the State Board of Equalization, which Board they abuse in chorus. Nothing more disreputable in partisan journalism has appeared in this State, it has done so in any State. This thing, it is proper to state, was begun by the Republican journals. It makes no difference who is responsible for the measure, it is a good one. Boards of this kind are not new in the country. Their general character and duties were as well understood before the passage of the law as they are since the adjournment of the Oregon Board. The Constitution of this State makes it the duty of the Legislature to provide for uniformity and equality in the assessment and taxation of property throughout the State. There is no other way to secure the uniformity in assessments and the consequent equality in taxation required by the Constitution and common justice than by this or a similar measure. The law creating a State Board of Equalization is correct in principle and we are not disposed to deny the Republicans of Oregon the credit to which they are entitled for its passage. The House of Representatives, in this State—the popular and controlling branch of the legislature—was largely Republican. If we are not mistaken, the bill originated in that House. The Senate, on a strictly party vote, was a tie. The Democrats had, therefore, no control in either House. We mention this merely to show the absurdity of the attempt to make this a partisan measure, and more particularly a Democratic one.

"It is complained that the Board has exceeded its authority; has made a most unfair and unequal distribution of the State burdens, etc. If this be true, then the members of that Board must answer for it; and that is all there is of that. The charges against the Board may be well founded. We are not prepared to say that its judgment throughout has been the best; that its action has been the wisest. It would be remarkable, if in the organization of this system, mistakes are not committed. When such is the fact, let them be pointed out, specifically. Now, what are the complaints in the present instance? It is complained in Benton county that the cattle and lands in that county are assessed too high. Cattle were returned by the County Assessor at \$8 79 per head. This assessment was simply shameful. It was raised by the Board to \$16. Did the Board do wrong? In seven counties, cattle were returned by counties at over \$16 per head, while they were returned in twelve counties at over \$15. This shows that the Board did not adopt a rule that was arbitrary, or that in the opinion of a majority of the counties, was excessive. But, says the Benton Democrat, the cattle of Benton county are mostly young, while those of other counties are older. This is enough to provoke a smile. The cattle of that county were returned without any specification as to age, we surmise, and had to be treated by the Board as "cattle." If the cattle in that county are all calves, and persist in remaining so, and the Assessor obstinately treats them as cattle, it is not the fault of the State Board. But it is also urged these cattle are hundreds of miles away from market, the cost of transporting them to which must be considered. Very well! In Multnomah county cattle are assessed at \$18 75. The Board has made no reduction—a fact which may have escaped the attention of some. Ought there to be a greater difference between this and Benton county? Cattle are assessed in Grant county at \$7 56. Portland is one of the markets of that county for this trade. The cost of transportation from that county to Portland is greater than it is from Benton. Now, why should not Mr. Smith, who happens to be a large cattle owner in Benton, be assessed for his cattle at \$16, when Mr. Jones, of Grant, is assessed for his at even a higher figure? In Jackson, a still more remote county, cattle were returned at \$16 06. That county has no home market. She depends upon California to purchase from her. We present these facts to the dispassionate criticism of candid men. More than half the counties in Oregon assess their cattle at a figure that averages as high as that fixed by the Board.

"We have not the time to pursue this subject further at present. What we have said in respect to Benton county and the item of cattle will apply to other counties, and, we apprehend to other items of complaint. "There is evidently a very great want of information as to the action of the Board; as an instance of which we call attention to the statement of the Benton Democrat, that the assessment of the O. S. N. Company's property was reduced \$100,000 below the county officer's figures. Nothing could be further from the fact. So far from being reduced, the assessment of the property of that company was increased by some \$3,000 or more. We trust the people of Oregon will, in view of these facts, investigate thoroughly and deliberate carefully before rushing to hasty conclusions. The Board may have made mistakes in certain particulars, and when our attention is called to such mistakes, we shall be quite ready to condemn."
