



The decision of the Federal Circuit Court for Connecticut practically stops the Government from obtaining present redress for the Credit pleasant trip. We expect to hear from the Mobilier frauds. The constitutionality of the special act of Congress, under which the suit was brought, is sustained; but another point in the case was, the demurrer raised by the Union Pacific Railroad Company on the ground that the United States had not such an interest in the subject matter as entitled them to bring suit to redress wrongs committed by the Union Pacific Railroad Company. 




