

The History and Character of Geo. H. Williams.

For the information of those of our readers who are not acquainted with the history of Attorney General Williams, we publish the following article from the Utica, N. Y., Observer.

George H. Williams, of New York, Iowa, Oregon, Washington, and elsewhere, is Grant's appointee for the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The New York Sun of a late date says: We have information in reference to the nomination of George H. Williams for Chief Justice of the United States which is unfit for publication, but of a character which seems to render his rejection by the Senate very probable.

The Vice President will be absent from his chair for several weeks. Senator Carpenter is the Republican caucus nominee for President pro tem. of the United States Senate.

George H. Williams was born in Columbia county on the 23rd of March, 1823. He received a common school education, studied law, and removed to Iowa, where he commenced practice.

He made an immediate strike for office, and joined his fortunes to the party which happened to be in power in the State at the time—the Democracy. In 1847 he was elected Judge of the First Judicial District.

The entire voting population of Iowa then about equalled that of Oneida county now, and Williams's Judicial District numbered fewer citizens than our Second Assembly District.

In 1852 he lost his office and cast about for another place. He served as one of the Presidential electors who cast the vote of the State for Franklin Pierce, and immediately after the inauguration of that President he hastened to Washington to claim his reward.

After much importunity he succeeded in getting himself appointed Territorial Judge of Oregon. He held the office five years, and then resigned to enter more actively into politics.

On the election of Mr. Lincoln, Williams of course became a Republican. Political adventurer of his class invariably float their "principles" in the current of patronage.

Congressional election. U. S. Attorney Gibbs, believing that the jury was packed, moved to have another Grand Jury summoned, which motion was sustained by Judge Deady.

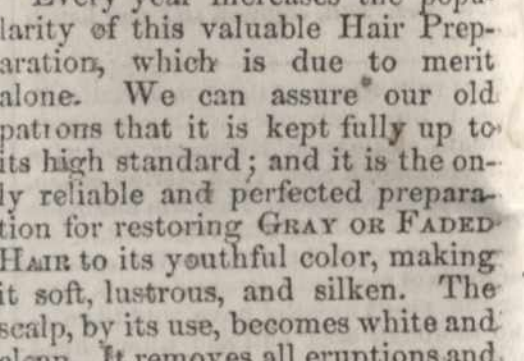
