

The Columbia River Route.

The Walla Walla Union of Dec. 20th, says:

As the Columbia river is, and must, for a time at least, be our only route to the sea, the question of how to make the best of it is one that deeply interests us all.

It is claimed that it would be more expedient to not use the waters of the river between Celilo and the lower Cascades at all.

This would save numerous handlings of freight and would of course be much the more speedy way.

There are, of course, difficulties to be overcome, but the practicability of the pass for a railroad route is too well established to require further demonstration.

The Northern Pacific Company has decided it to be practicable for a broad gauge road, and it certainly would be more so for a narrow gauge.

At a rough estimate, we have heard it said that this piece of road could be built and equipped for a million dollars.

Such a road would lay the produce of this river about as near the sea as Portland is.

True it would be a few miles further away, but as large, or larger vessels, can come to the Cascades as can go to Portland—at least that is what we have been told.
