Rights of Pupils in Public Schools.

An interesting case has lately been tried in Illinois to test the right of Trustees of public schools to enforce a uniform course of study for all pupils. The case as reported presents the following facts: Miss Post was a member of the junior class in the High School of Durand township, Winnebago county, for which class bookkeeping was a prescribed study. The mother of Miss Post objected to her daughter studying bookkeeping under the plea that her health would not admit of it. For this refusal, alleged as an act of disobedience, the young lady was expelled from the school, and it was averred in the testimony that force was used in putting her out. After such proceeding the step father of Miss Post applied to the school directors for her reinstatement, but they refused except on condition that she should study bookkeeping. The parents were persistent in their refusal, and they then sought redress in the courts. A verdict was rendered for the plaintiff under the direction of the Judge, the teacher for the trespass committed in the act of expulsion being mulcted in the sum of \$130 damages. The Judge held that although it is the duty of the School Boards to make reasonable regulations for the conduct of public schools and to prescribe a certain course of study, parents and guardians have a right to select from the studies prescribed the special ones they desire their children or wards to pursue. An intimation was, however, made by the Judge that no study could be rejected from mere whim or perversity, but only on fair and reasonable grounds. The Judge also laid down the law that the refusal of a pupil, under the direction of parent, to pursue a certain study, does not warrant expulsion.

THE "CREEPING" OF RAILROADS.—The "creeping" of railroads has attracted some mention of late, and while we do not attempt to explain it, we offer a point on the fact that on lines running North and South the Western rail "creep" faster than the Eastern rail; that is, this strange movement of the rail towards the South is more marked in one rail than in the other on the same track. Furthermore, it has been noticed that on such lines the Eastern rail wears out the fastest. Both of these points, we think can be explained by the motion of the earth as it turns from the West towards the East. Everything that has free motion is dragged after the whirling globe; every wind that blows, and every tide that moves feels the influence, and our train going North and South is pulled over towards the East, and naturally presses the Eastern rail more heavily. The Western rail, being relieved of its share of weight,—"creeps" more frequently and quickly. It is also noticed that the wheels that run on the Eastern rails wear out the fastest, and we but think that the earth's motion is the true cause. The practical of this, is that the Eastern rail and wheels should be stronger.—Scientific American.

THE NORTHERN LAKES.—General Roberts, of the Engineer Corps, U. S. Army, has published an interesting paper on the great Northern Lakes and their relation to cheap transportation. His proposition is to divert the surplus waters of Lake Superior into the Mississippi River, so as to make that stream at all times navigable from the Lake to the Gulf. According to his estimate the surplus water discharged by Lake Superior over Sault Ste. Marie is 90,000 cubic feet per second. It is ten times the volume that the Upper Mississippi pours over the Falls of St. Anthony. General Roberts is sure that twenty thousand cubic feet of this surplus waters will abundantly feed the Mississippi River, and keep it navigable in the dry seasons throughout the entire length. In the same manner the surplus waters of the other lakes can be carried into the Illinois and Wabash Rivers in sufficient volume to keep them always navigable. The effect on the St. Lawrence River of drawing away this water would be, General Roberts thinks, almost imperceptible, since it would not take away the water shed supply of that stream, but only economize the water lost by evaporation.
