

LATE NEWS.

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 12.—A report just received from Fort Fetterman states that the Indians attacked a wood party near there this morning. Twenty five men have been sent to their relief. Gen. Smith, at Fort Laramie, telegraphs that he has just received information that arms and ammunition are en route to the Agency, furnished by the Interior Department. Capt. Eagan was ordered out to intercept the train and bring the arms and ammunition to the post. It is estimated that there are about 8,000 warriors—Sioux, Cheyennes and Arapahoes, who could be in the field on call. If the whole of them are on the war path—which the nature of their attacks along the line from Fort Fetterman to Republican river would indicate,—to oppose them there are but three companies of cavalry and nine of infantry.

CHEYENNE, Feb. 14th. The Cheyenne Leader has a special dispatch from Fort Fetterman, which states that a Cheyenne runner has just arrived there from Red Cloud Agency, who said that Red Cloud's son was killed last Monday by a party of Sioux, whom he had compelled to return stolen stock. He reports that nearly all the Cheyennes and Sioux have left the Agency, and that 150 lodges are now within fifty miles of Fort Fetterman, and will come in or send to the post. He reports plenty of buffalo in the Big Horn country, and thinks the Sioux will go there. Two companies of cavalry were ordered from here to Fort Laramie today.

CHEYENNE, Feb. 13th. No reliable information has been received to day in regard to Indian troubles. Governor Campbell made a requisition on the War Department for the quota of arms due this Territory, and he to day received a telegram stating that the arms and ammunition will be forwarded immediately from Leavenworth arsenal for the use of the citizens should it become necessary for them to protect themselves against Indians.

St. Louis, Feb. 14th. W. R. Smith, Agent of Adam's Express Co., at Granby, Mo., reports that several men entered his office yesterday afternoon, gagged him and robbed the safe of \$3,100. The robbers are supposed to belong to the Gadsbill band.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14th. A special to the Tribune, referring to the information on the moiety system, which the Ways and Means Committee have finally secured, says the members of the Chambers of Commerce and a Special Agent will be heard next Tuesday. Startling revelations are promised. There is evidence in abundance to show that informers and Custom House officials have made it their business to corrupt the clerks whose business it is to look after the Custom House affairs in large mercantile houses, by persuading them to see that errors in invoices, sufficient to condemn the whole, should be allowed to creep in. If anything like a light is made by the Custom officials, it will result in the uncovering of frauds such as must and in wholesale reform.

It is proposed to disperse with St. Patrick's Day parade this year and give the money which it would cost for the relief of the poor.

CHICAGO, Feb. 14th. Mrs. Thompson, living on the corner of Trumbull street and Bissell avenue, was found in her room this afternoon insensible and apparently dying. Two of her four children were dead, the third was dying and the fourth was very ill. It is supposed that they were poisoned in some way, but it is not positively known that such is the case.

ATLANTA, Feb. 14th. At Rutledge, Ga., last night, L. M. Wood poisoned three of his children and shot himself. His wife had deserted him.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13th. The First National Gold Bank of Quincy, Illinois, was robbed last night of \$100,000 in currency and a large quantity of bonds and other valuable papers. No clue to the robbers.

BOSTON, Feb. 13th. The House of Representatives this afternoon voted 118 to 89 to rescind the Sumner censure resolution. The Senate has done likewise.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13th. In the Senate, to day, Mitchell introduced a bill authorizing the construction of a bridge across the Willamette River, at Salem, Oregon.—Referred to the Committee on Commerce.

HAVANA, Feb. 13.—A Correspondent says letters from the insurrectionary districts, dated Jan. 12th, says that a few days previously Gen. Calixto Garcia attacked the village of Corraito, seizing an immense number of cattle. The Spaniards left their intrenchments, but were driven back into the fort, leaving behind 12 killed and fifteen rifles. On the 9th inst., at the same place, an action took place which lasted eight hours. The Spaniards were about 1,000 strong, and were forced to retreat into their encampment, leaving forty killed and many arms. The total loss is calculated at 200. The Cuban loss in killed and wounded is 60.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—A Key West dispatch states that it is reported by steamer from Havana, that seven thousand volunteers have taken the city, compelling the Captain General to take refuge on board the Spanish war steamer Arapiles.
