HOGEM.—We take the following from a private letter received this week: The Summit Mine owned by Packwood and Stewart is looking first-rate. The level tunnel that is running south from the 130 feet station is showing a fine body of ore. A winze is being raised, to connect the air-shaft, exposing a fair ledge all the way through from one to six feet in width.—The main sinking is being pushed as rapidly as possible from the 210 feet level; this slope is opening out a vein two feet thick, which prospects from twenty to twenty-five dollars per ton. They have about 300 tons of quartz on the dump, and, by the time the roads are dry enough to haul, will have not less than 5 or 600 more. The snow is four feet deep at this place.
