Across the Mountains.

Having a little leisure time on our hands last week we concluded to cross the Mountains by the way of Mr. John Dooley's Toll Road, which we found in good condition, and the grades on the mountain much improved within the last year. This is now one of the best mountain roads that we have ever traveled over. At the Toll Gate, at the foot of mountain is to be found the residence of Mr. Dooley, where the very best of accommodations are to be had.—Mrs. Dooley is one of the most pleasant landladies that we have met. It is 18 miles from Baker City to the Toll Gate.

CLARKS CREEK.—On last Thursday we visited this mining camp and found that all the miners were busily at work, and that a good mining season is anticipated by all the citizens of Clarks Creek. This is one of the best mining camps in Baker county. Here we also found Messrs. Buckland & Virtue and Geo. W. Lake with stocks of goods in store, adapted to the wants of the community. The stocks of both these houses are rather low, as they have not received their spring goods yet. We also found that Mr. Richardson, instead of Messrs. Buckland & Virtue, had bought Mr. Curtis' Saloon, and "Rich" is always pleased to have his friends give him a call. The Clarks Creek Brewery, kept by Messrs. Trunk & Rust, is a favorite place of resort. Mr. E. Wendt keeps the Livery Stable and also accommodates the weary traveler in a comfortable and home like manner.

ELDORADO.—At this camp the streets of the town are deserted during the daytime, as all the miners here are at work in their claims. There has been pretty good prospects struck in a tunnel running into the hill back of the town. The general impression is that the miners will do well in this camp the present season. Great hopes are now placed on the benefits to be derived from the Big Ditch since Messrs. Packwood & Carter have been placed in charge of it. They have all the men they have been able to secure at work cleaning out and putting the Ditch in repair and good running order, and expect to have the water running in it within ten or twelve days. The miners have confidence in Messrs. Packwood & Carter, and render them all the aid in their power. Mrs. Hardman keeps the Eldorado Hotel, sets a good table and furnishes clean beds, Edwards & Richardson run the Eclipse Saloon, and are always pleased to have their friends call as

they pass along. T. J. Brower keeps a fine stock of goods and is the agent for Wells, Fargo & Co. Messrs Packwood & Co. also have a fine assortment of clothing &c., in store which they are selling at most reasonable prices. The future of Eldorado has the appearance of being bright.

MALHEUR CITY.—This town is located about one and a half miles from Eldorado, and is surrounded by good paying mines and everybody is at work. The miners here, as well as at Eldorado, look to the Big Ditch to help them out in their mining operations. Malheur is a pretty clean little town, and has the appearance of being a good place for business. Here we found Miss Mary Collins with a good stock of goods in store and in a first class fire proof cellar, ready to attend to the wants of customers. We also found J. Devereaux as the proprietor of a fine saloon with two good billiard tables in it; and there we also found our friend Wm. Harper, as mine host of the hotel of the place. He sets a good table and the beds are good, clean and neat.

AMELIA.—At this camp the miners are doing well. Messrs. Barnhart & Quinn have been running in their claims for some time, and on turning their water off their sluice boxes the other day the gold that made its appearance was a pretty sight to see. We have not learned the amount of their clean up, but it must have been large.

At all of the above camps we received a goodly number of new subscribers to the BEDROCK DEMOCRAT, with the promise of many more. The citizens across the mountains treated us well and invited us to pay them another visit, which we intend to do when we can find time.

THE ROSADEL.—Mrs. Fulford, supported by an excellent company, among whom are Messrs. Fulford, Coxon, Dennis, and Kane, is now in the upper country giving entertainments that are seldom excelled anywhere. The company played three nights in LaGrande and gave unbounded satisfaction. We have known hesitancy recommending the Rosadels to all theatergoers as meeting their patronage and support.

The Theatrical Troupe spoken of above, by the La Grande Sentinel, is now playing to good houses in our city. On last Monday evening they played the "Daughter of the Regiment," and concluded with the farce "Perfection," and on last evening, they played the "Lady of Lyons." This evening there will be two good pieces, Colleen Bawn and the Spectre Bride Groom, put upon the boards. This company is highly spoken of wherever they have appeared, and their acting here sustains their well merited reputation.
