W. T. Wright and family left here on last Wednesday for Willow Creek, in Umatilla county. His wife will visit relatives in that section, and he will proceed to Wallula on business connected with the Walla Walla and Wallula Railroad.

LATE NEWS.

LONDON, June 5—5:30 A. M.—Jefferson Davis sailed for New York to-day on the steamship Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The Com. on Elections, by a vote of 6 against 5, agreed not to report the resolution of Hazeltan reciting that Delegate Cannon had been proven a polygamist, having married one of his wives since the passage of the anti-polygamy law of 1862, and therefore should be expelled. The Committee also voted down a resolution postponing all action in the case, but it is generally believed that further consideration of the question will be postponed till next session.

CHICAGO, June 5.—A Washington special says that it was represented to Gen. Bristow that a very strong pressure was being brought to bear to retain Sawyer as Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, the General very promptly and decisively remarked: "If Mr. Sawyer does not go, I will not remain. We cannot sail in the same ship!" The result is that after a hard struggle Sawyer has agreed to resign, and will send an informal letter to that effect to-morrow. So the last of the Sanborn crowd has finally withdrawn.

SAN DIEGO, June 3d.—The San Diego World has the following from Arizona:

PRESCOTT, June 1st.—In accordance with orders issued by General Crook, dated May 30th, Post Camp

Beale Springs, being no longer needed for military purposes, is discontinued, and La Paz is recognized as a new military station.

YUMA, June 1st.—The Colorado is still rising slowly. The general opinion is that an overflow will occur, which will exceed that of the Gila last July. The amount of water passing off is immense, and the river is running swiftly. The steamer Cocoph left for the mouth of the river yesterday, taking a large list of passengers.

THE Union has the following:

PRESCOTT, June 2d.—The Albuquerque Review, just received, states that a brutal murder was committed on the 17th of May, two miles north of Rio Puerco. Two Mexicans, named Valencia and Garcia, were killed by a party of seven masked men. Valencia had a rope tied around his neck, and was dragged on the ground until life was extinct. Garcia was taken from his house and killed with an axe and his throat cut. Both men had families, and were murdered in the vicinity of their homes. Guards were placed over their houses to prevent the escape of any member of the household, and the recognition of any of the murderers. Valencia was 60 and Garcia 35 years of age. It is supposed the cause of the murder originated in lawsuit tried at the Tucson courts a year ago. So far no clue to the perpetrators has been found.

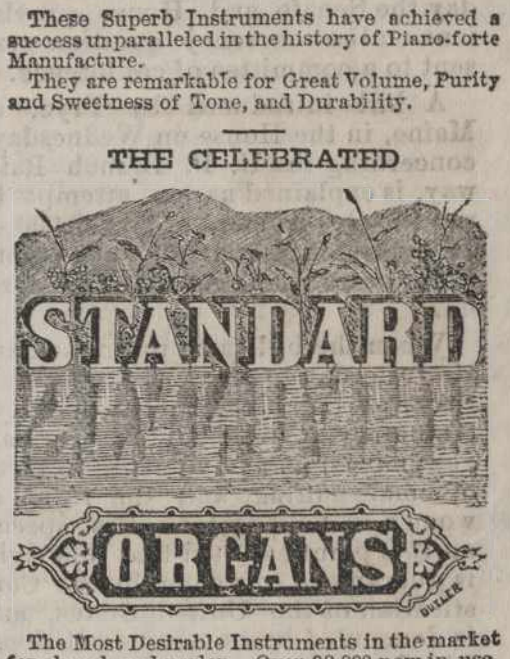
