THE 4TH AT UNION.—We, with several others from Baker City, including the Baker City Brass Band, attended the celebration of the 4th at Union, the future County Seat of Union Co. The celebration was gotten up in a hurry, and those interested in the management complain that they did not have time sufficient to perfect all the arrangements as they wished, but we must say for them, that we think that they could not have done better or given more entire satisfaction than they did, if they had had weeks instead of days to prepare for the occasion. Messrs. A. C. Craig and James Hendershott, officers of the day, understood their duties and performed them well. The reader of the day, Mr. F. Stark, read the Declaration of Independence as well or better than we have heard it read for years—in fact, he can be classed as a first rate reader. After the reading of the Declaration, Mr. Theodore Geer, the orator of the day, was introduced, and delivered a well written and appropriate Oration—which we will publish, commencing with our next issue. The tables were set in Mr. John Creighton's grove immediately adjacent to Uniontown, and is a beautiful place for such gatherings. The tables were loaded with all the substantial and a large variety of luxuries to satisfy the hungry and gratify the palate of the epicure. There was an abundance for the five or six hundred persons present, and to spare. The celebration was gotten up by the citizens of the Cove, Union and vicinity, and reflected great honor on all parties interested. After the ceremonies at the Grove, the Hudson Bros.' Hall was brought into requisition, and at three o'clock in the afternoon dancing commenced, and was kept up until the close of the 4th, at midnight—we heard, it hinted that the time pieces had been set back an hour or two, so as to make the night as long as possible before the Sabbath would admonish them to desist from their pleasant amusement, and if this was accidentally the case, we have not a word to say—we were there, but had no time piece with us. The music was good, and Mrs. Jaycox, who presided a portion of the time at the Organ, done herself credit as a proficient musician, both vocal and instrumental. The supper for the ball, for an impromptu affair, was a complete success, and reflected great credit on the lady who prepared it.
