OFFICIAL VOTE FOR STATE OFFICERS.—The following are the correct number of votes received by the different candidates at the late State election. Some of the counties neglected to make complete returns at the proper time; this is the reason that we have been so long getting the final and correct result. We now give the correct vote for all the candidates on the State Ticket:—Governor Grover has 9606 votes, Tollman 9155, Campbell 6489; Congressman La Dow 9516, Williams 9345, Davenport 6365; Secretary of State Chadwick 12017, Foster 8563, Douthitt 5712; Treasurer Brown 10218, Clark 9060, Beach 6294; Printer Brown 10311, Wate 8938, Hand 5789; School Superintendent Dawne 9061, Rowland 9625, Oglesby 5546. There were 26,292 votes cast for Secretary of State; 25,226 for Congress; 25,250 for Governor; 25,512 for State Treasurer; 25,191 for State Printer—Turner, the Temperance candidate receiving 117 votes; and for Superintendent of Schools 24,732. Chadwick received more votes than any other candidate on the Democratic ticket—12,017, and La Dow the highest number of votes of the Republican ticket—9,625, and Foster the smallest number—8,563. Campbell is the highest on the Independent ticket—6,489; and Oglesby the lowest—5,546.

THE RACE.—The race on last Saturday, over the Baker City Race Course, between Brown Dick and Joe Buggins, six hundred yards for three hundred dollars a side, was won by Joe Buggins. There was considerable dissatisfaction manifested at the result, it being contended by parties that the race was a throwoff. There was one or two races after the main race, on the result of which considerable amounts changed hands. We hope to see good purses offered on this track this fall. The horsemen of Idaho and Washington Territories wish to meet our Oregon horsemen on this track this fall and contend for the laurels. Good purses will bring a large number of good horses for a full week's race, and our city will be overrun with strangers. It is to the interest of every one of our citizens all over the county, and especially of our business men that good and liberal purses be given. Let every one of us give liberally to this object.

PINK DENTISTRY.—We were yesterday shown a fine dental operation executed by Dr. C. H. Mack, of Portland, now on a professional visit to this city. It was that of building up a front tooth which had been much decayed and broken away. His mode of operating was to insert in the tooth delicate gold screws with instruments expressly for that purpose, both of which we understand, are of the Dr.'s own invention, then the gold was closely welded onto the screws and built up to the proper form of the tooth, giving it a very nice finish. It is gratifying to know that such operations are obtainable in our midst after the very indifferent ones performed by parties claiming to be dentists. We trust our friends will not hesitate to avail themselves of this opportunity to obtain first class dentistry. The operator referred to above is in the mouth of W. C. Miller.

VIRGIL MINE.—There are between thirty and forty men at work. The mill commenced crushing to-day. Everything is working finely.

## LATE NEWS.

IMMIGRATION.—We learn from the Idaho Statesman of July 25th, we learn that Mr. John W. Bailey, from Junction City, Kansas, is on his way to Oregon. He has traveled all the way with horse teams, and reports a large immigration on the plains. One train from Fort Scott has one hundred wagons and families destined for Oregon. He represents times very hard in Kansas; no money and crops a failure. On an average not one fair crop in three years. The people are getting away as fast as they can, but are too poor to come by railroad; they could not sell their teams for enough to pay their fare to Kelton. What do our people think of the above description of crops, hard times etc. We guess Oregon will do for a while yet.

The Northwestern Stage Company run their coaches on fast time between this place and the River, and bring the mails, when delivered to them, promptly. We do not think the contractor between the Dalles and Portland is a success as a mail-carrier.

McCord Bros. 30-horse power engine, lately used for running a saw mill at Pocahontas, is being removed to Rye Valley for the purpose of being used as the motive power in running Gilchrist & Co.'s quartz mill.

The editor of the Panama Star, apologizes for the non-appearance of his paper by saying that he has to hunt off to dig buckshot out of his legs.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Indian Agent Irwin of the Shoshone and Banuck Indians in Wyoming Territory, reports to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, under date of 6th inst that on the morning of June 30th the Shoshone agent reported a camp of hostile Indians on the western slope of Powder River Mountain. General Ord and General Sheridan had arrived the same day at Camp Brown, and knowing that the camp could be no other than that of the Arapahoes and Cheyennes that have been murdering people for a number of years, and from which raiding parties were already organized, it was determined to punish them. On the evening of July 1st Captain Bates of Company, B, Second Cavalry, Lieutenant Young with twenty enlisted Shoshone scouts and 200 Shoshone Militia, took up the line of march for the enemy's camp, traveling at night. The command drew up in the rear of the village—numbering fifteen lodges—on the morning of July 4th, and a battle commenced, which lasted from three to four hours. The Arapahoes were evidently surprised and ran in herds of men, women and children to a rocky point which commanded the village. The number of killed cannot be determined, but it is not less than fifty. Lieut. Young was severely but not dangerously wounded.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The Grand Jury of the District Circuit Court have found true bills against A. H. Underwood, member of the late District Legislature and also engaged as messenger in the District Controller's office, and Thomas B. Warwick, a street broker, and clerk in the same office, both colored charged with forgery in copying forged orders for certificates of pay of policemen and firemen.

SALT LAKE, July 20.—The Liberal or Anti Mormon Convention met today in this city. Nearly every county in the Territory was represented. The platform declares for free speech, free ballot and free schools, with an ecologic resolution on the administration of President Grant on Utah affairs. Robert N. Baskin a prominent lawyer and old-line Democrat, was nominated by acclamation as candidate for Delegate to Congress.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Mrs. Tilton's statement is published. It is long and explicit. She absolutely and solemnly denies that she ever committed adultery with Beecher, and that he ever was guilty of an indecent act or suggestion in her presence. She reproves Tilton for his free love doctrines and declares in substance that his conduct towards for years has been that of a traitor, coward and heathen. The Committee of Investigation was examining original letters last night.

NEW YORK, July 24.—A strong pressure is being brought to bear to make the examination in the Beecher case public, and it is likely the scandal will drift into the courts.

ELKO, July 24.—10 P. M.—A water spout is reported to have crossed the Central Pacific road, between Humboldt Wells and Toano, this afternoon, doing considerable damage to the track. The western bound emigrant train is reported to have been thrown from the track, caused by the wash out, and five passengers killed. All that can be learned of the disaster is that the railroad company sent a wrecking car eastward and took the company's surgeon from here.—If the names of the injured can be obtained to-morrow, with the particulars of the disaster, a complete report will be furnished to the press.

CALIFORNIA'S GOLDEN SHOWER OF GRAIN.—Last year we opened our eyes and mouths to marvel over the immensity of the California wheat crop, and this year we are still further astounded by the information that the crop of 1873 will be more than doubled. The area under cultivation is upward of 2,000,000 acres 300,000 acres more than last year, and the yield is extraordinary fine. The total crop is estimated at a minimum figure of 35,000,000 bushels leaving 25,000,000 bushels for export—nearly twice the greatest amount that California has ever furnished for exportation, more than all the rest of the United States exported last year, and twice as much as Russia exported from her great grain districts on the Danube. California's gold yield is a mere trifle compared with this golden shower of grain. The greatest desideratum is adequate land and water transportation to markets.

The Oregon Tribune says the first number of the "Baker City Journal" has been received; but it is so wretchedly printed that we cannot read it; hence we cannot tell whether it will set the classic Powder on fire or not.
