QUARTERLY MEETING.—Quarterly Meeting of the M. E. Church will commence on Saturday evening next, at 8 o'clock, and continue over Sabbath. It will be held in the new church. Rev. H. K. Hines officiating.

There are some thirty horses in training at Boise City for the races there next month. The Sturgill boys left here with their race stock last week, for Boise City.

Jack Reid and Bob McCord started to Silver City, on a business trip, last Monday.

NASHVILLE, Sept. 16.—Brevet Major General Pennybacker, regimental staff and troops at Nashville post have been ordered to New Orleans to day to report to Gen. Emery for duty.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Mail Superintendent Sicaauker telegraphed to the Postmaster General from New Orleans to day that mail communication, which had been interrupted has been resumed.

A Cabinet meeting to day resulted in the following dispatch, from Adjutant General Townsend to Gen. Emery, commanding Federal forces in Louisiana:

Under no circumstances recognize the insurgent Government in Louisiana within five days from date, when the time given in proclamation to the insurgents will expire, and such action will be taken as the emergency may require.

By order of the President. E. D. TOWNSEND, Adjutant General.

The President has abandoned the idea for the present, his intention of returning to Long Branch, the events in Louisiana detaining him in Washington.

It is probable that should the troubles increase in Louisiana, that it may be added to Sheridan's Department, or Gen. Terry may be ordered to New Orleans, to rank Gen. Emery in command. Though no vessels have been ordered to New Orleans, those comprising the North Atlantic squadron may soon appear in that vicinity. These things have been considered, and a large number of available troops have been ordered to Louisiana.

RAILROAD MEETING.

A large number of the citizens of Portland assembled at the Court House last Saturday evening in response to a call signed by a great number of the business men of the city. The object of such meeting was to express, by a series of resolutions, the sentiment of the community relative to the construction of the Portland, Dalles and Salt Lake Railroad, and to urge upon the consideration of the Legislature such action as is necessary to insure the successful inauguration of the enterprise. Although quite large, and a fair proportion of the taxable property of the city was represented, the attendance, we regret to say, was not as large as could have been desired—certainly not so numerous as was expected.

At 8 o'clock Judge J. H. Reed called the meeting to order, and nominated Chas. M. Carter, Esq., as Chairman.

The motion prevailed, whereupon Mr. Carter came forward and took the Chair.

Richard Williams, Esq., placed in nomination Judge J. H. Woodward as Secretary. The motion prevailed.

The Chairman announced that a statement of the objects of the meeting would now be in order. Loud calls were made for Col. W. W. Chapman, in response to which that gentleman came forward and addressed the meeting for a few minutes. Col. Chapman, in the course of his remarks, gave a succinct history of the enterprise to which he has been devoting several years of indetigable labor, giving an account of the present condition of the project, its prospects of ultimate success, and concluding with a statement of the objects and purposes of the present meeting. It was simply to induce State legislation in favor of the enterprise and to secure aid in that direction.

At the conclusion of Col. Chapman's remarks Mr. J. H. Reed moved that a Committee of three be appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the drift of the meeting. The motion prevailed and the chair appointed as the committee Messrs. J. H. Reed, W. W. Page and R. Williams. Judge Page was called out and spoke for a short time, urging in the strongest terms the construction of the road; asking the people to invoke the aid of the State in promoting this important enterprise, which is of such vital interest to Oregon, and especially to the city of Portland.

RESOLUTIONS.

The committee stated that they were ready to submit their report, which they handed to the Secretary who read as follows:

WHEREAS, In the opinion of this meeting the construction of the P. D. & S. L. R. R. is of paramount importance in assuring the prosperity and welfare of the whole Pacific Northwest, and especially so to Oregon, the said road being the great central artery connecting the North Pacific coast with the world of commerce, immigration, wealth and enterprise lying east of the Rocky mountains seeking easy flow to our shores to populate our country, and develop the vast and varied resources, agricultural, mining, and manufacturing, thereby multiplying and enhancing the values of property and increasing the sources of revenue. And

WHEREAS, It is the sense of this meeting that the Columbia river is justly entitled to be styled the great commercial artery of the Pacific Northwest, opening the way through the Cascade and Coast ranges of mountains for the products of a country embraced by seven degrees of latitude and eleven degrees of longitude, with unsurpassed climate, soil and productions; and

WHEREAS, The enterprise of the Portland, Dalles and Salt Lake Railroad has progressed to a point where, in the opinion of this meeting the State, and every lover of the country, should put forth the best efforts to assure it complete success. Therefore

Resolved, That the Legislature, as a measure of the first importance, should so modify the aid heretofore granted toward the construction of said road as that the consideration for the work to be performed may be

available as the work shall progress not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000 per annum; and should appropriate a sufficient sum of money to defray the preliminary expenses of prosecuting this important enterprise.

J. H. REED, R. WILLIAMS, W. W. PAGE.

A motion was made and seconded that the preamble and resolution as read be adopted, which received a unanimous vote.

Judge J. H. Reed, in response to loud calls, appeared, and delivered a splendid speech of about five minutes in length, in which he uttered some very plain truths and made a number of "palpable hits" about the apparent want of enterprise of the people of the State, and the public apathy which to prevail on an issue so vital, and the consummation of a project which would confer great and permanent benefits on the whole State. Judge Reed's remarks elicited frequent applause, which plainly indicated that the audience appreciated the plain truth and that they did not belong to the class of men to which the speaker had referred.

At the close of Mr. Reed's remarks the meeting adjourned.

MORE RECONSTRUCTION.

The nearer the day of election approaches in the Southern States the more fruitful are the subterfuges invented by the leaders of the Radical party to control the Southern people. The telegrams inform us that the National Radical Republican Committee are already at work and they have published a call for a large convention to meet at Atlanta, Georgia, on the 12th day of October. "To consider the condition of the South and to suggest reforms necessary to secure perfect reconstruction in those States." This is the key note that the Southern States must be again put into the crucible of reconstruction. State elections are now coming on. Two years hence, the Presidential election is to take place and Grant wants a renomination and election. His power is fading away in the North and his only hope of safety is to subdue the Southern people just as they are rising up from the debris of his late rebellion.

Negro suffrage was adopted by the Republican party not for any particular love for the negro, but because it was necessary for the success of their party. This was boldly proclaimed by the leaders. The South must now be again reconstructed in order to perpetuate another four years of tyranny on the intelligent and law abiding people of that section. Democratic victories have terrified the Radicals into this last resort and the sweeping Democratic victories that will crown the party in October and November will so shatter the forces of Grant and his followers, that they will not have the courage in face of a strong public opinion to try the gag law and the damnable doctrine of reconstruction on the Southern people.—Salem Mercury.
