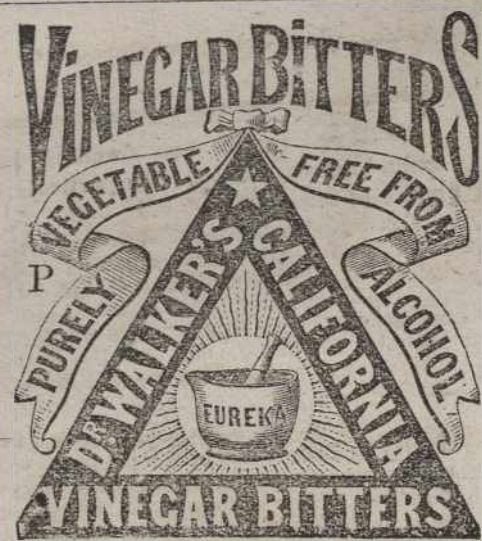
LATE NEWS.

NEW YORK, November 12th.—A dispatch from Wachita river, Indian Territory, November 7th, via Fort Dodge, reported that the most gallant, trying and desperate Indian fight of the campaign occurred yesterday about thirty miles from this place, on McClelland creek. It was conducted by Captain H. J. Farnsworth, commanding a portion of Company H, Eighth United States Cavalry, numbering only 28 men. The engagement commenced at half past 1 o'clock p. m., with a hundred Chyennes, Kiowas and Arrapachos, exceedingly well mounted and in full fighting trim, and having the advantage of higher ground, equal arms (breech loading) and a more abundant supply of ammunition than

Farnsworth's plucky fellows. The latter fought like tigers, disparting every inch of ground until dark, losing one man killed and four wounded, and killing fifteen Indians, a large number of ponies, and wounding fifty or more of the savages. The exhausting of his ammunition and a desire to care for his wounded men compelled Captain Farnsworth to retreat reluctantly under cover of night to this point, whence he had been sent out by Major Wm. Rodmond Price, of the Eight United States Cavalry, commanding the Wingate Battalion, to discover the whereabouts of the Indians. They were supposed to be in this vicinity, as a Cheyenne spy had been captured by Major Price individually, and others had been seen at this point. About dark, our soldiers slowly emerged out of a hollow where they had been hemmed in, and making a neck-or-nothing charge, succeeded in reaching the plains. The Indians did not dare to pursue, and they showed evident signs of severe punishment and of having enough of it for the time. Captain Farnsworth immediately struck out for this place, where we are resting, after having marched forty five miles between dark and sunrise, through a terrible cold night, causing the wounded men to suffer greatly. The horses had not eaten any thing since morning, and had performed a full day's march of twenty three miles before the action. The casualties are all of Company H, Eighth Cavalry; Private Wm. Deucham, killed; Corporal Thomas J. Thompson, wounded, dangerously; Trumpeter Hermann Teher, seriously; blacksmith Henry Poelds, seriously; private John Robinson, slightly. Immediately on the receipt of the news Major Price who had fought these same Indians on September 12th, near here, started out at once for the late scene of the action, with Capt. C. A. Hartwell and Lieutenant Morris, and Companies K and L Eighth United States Cavalry. The women and children brought up fresh ponies for the Indians, to replace those killed or disabled, and their arms were sometimes of a longer range than those of the troops.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—A Washington special says Senator Cameron of Pennsylvania had a long interview with the President yesterday, during which he gave his views of the causes of the recent Republican defeat in that State, protesting that it was not dissatisfaction with the party leaders nor with the legislation or principles of the party, but that it was owing to the hard times, and the fact that so many people were, by the stoppage of manufactures, out of employment. The Senator thought a great mistake was made in the last Congress not providing an increase of currency to meet the demands of the business interests. It is said the President replied that, while there might be some local reasons for the defeat in Pennsylvania, he didn't think they applied to New York and New Jersey, and other States that had reversed their political record and he informed Cameron very plainly that many of the leaders of the Republican party are, in his opinion, responsible for the turn in the political vote. The attacks made on the administration by Republicans in Congress the neglect of the last session to dispose of the financial issue, indifference to the Louisiana situation, though he had appealed for definite action in a special message, and other failures to meet the expectations of the country, had contributed to the defeat. Cameron agreed that there had been mistakes made by Congress, but he thought they were not in the main responsible for the recent changes. He agreed with the President that the third term nonsense had little to do with it. Pennsylvania was the first to declare against it, and yet they had lost the election, where there was no room for regret over any neglect on that issue. On the whole Cameron found the President keenly alive to the present situation, and not indifferent over the elections as he had been represented, and he came away from the White House fully satisfied as he expressed it, that the President means to do right.

"DON'T WAKE MY MOTHER".—Among the passengers by the westward bound emigrant train which arrived yesterday was Mrs. J. S. Crediford, an aged lady from Albert Maine. Poor, feeble and alone, she left her home to cross the continent on an emigrant train, to see her children residing in this State. Two grown daughters awaited her at San Jose, and her son had gone up the road to meet her. He found her worn out with the fatigues of the protracted journey in a comfortless emigrant car and very weak. About 6 o'clock in the evening she reclined her head on her son's shoulder and fell asleep there. Just after the train left San Leandro, a gentleman, who had got on the train at that place, noticing something peculiar in the attitude and appearance of the old lady, approached her son and inquired, "What is the matter with that lady?" "Hush!" replied the young man, "don't wake my mother." "No fear," said the gentleman, "she will never wake again in this world." He was right. Quietly leaning on the breast of her son, the poor old lady had yielded to fatigue and peacefully fallen into a slumber from which she passed into that deeper sleep that knows neither waking or weariness. The emigrants composed her limbs to rest, and brought the body to this city for the bereaved children.—S. F. Chronicle November 11th.

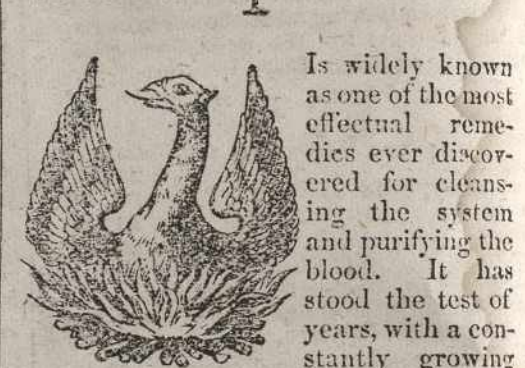
