VIRTUE MINE.—Mr. M. Hyde, Superintendent of the Virtue Mine, last week made another clean up after a run of thirteen days which was run into a bar at the Assay Office of J. W. Virtue, of our city, on last Tuesday. The bar weighed 356.55 ounces; was 918 fine, and worth Six thousand seven hundred and seventy six dollars and fourteen cents. This mine is improving in appearance and richness as it is sunk on, and is now paying handsome dividends over and above all expenses of working the Mine and running the Mill.

RETURNED.—Walter Fernald, who has been on a visit to San Francisco during the past winter, returned home by way of Portland, on last Saturday evening. He left Portland on last Tuesday week and came up on the first boat of the season from Portland to the Dalles. He is looking well. We are pleased to have him among us again. From the above it will be seen that the Columbia River between the Dalles and Portland is now open and boats are running regular. The river above the Dalles is still closed.

Virgil S. Eggleston.

The following brief review of the promotion, fall and disgrace of the man who was once honored by the title of Major V. S. Eggleston, Paymaster, U. S. A., we clip from the Troy (New York) Times, of Jan. 15th.

"The doors of the Albany penitentiary yesterday closed upon a young man whose brief history is indeed a sad one. His name is Virgil S. Eggleston, and he fell from one of the most responsible and honored positions in the United States. Born of greatly respected parents in the village of Palmyra, in this State, he received a good education and was prepared to discharge the duties of a worthy if not a prominent member of society. He possessed influential friends who secured for him a position in the paymaster general's department of the army. While residing in Washington and performing with fidelity the duties of a clerk in the employ of the government he became acquainted with the daughter of Henry Wilson's landlady, and eloped

with her. They were married, and returned to the maternal domicile. Mr. Wilson now interested himself in the young man, whose character was excellent, morals unexceptional, and intelligence superior. With the assistance of other friends, Mr. Wilson procured for young Eggleston the position of paymaster in the regular army, with the rank of major. His appointment was one of the last acts of Andrew Johnson's administration. The fact that he had been from civil life and given a position in the army which so many lieutenants and captains coveted, caused Eggleston to be regarded with a jealous eye and from the start he was unpopular in the service. Major Eggleston was in the Modoc war, and was one of the first to enter the lava beds after the cruel murder of General Canby. His heroism gained him some favor with the officers, and his military career now became more promising.

After giving an account of the embezzlement of the money, the reckless dissipation which led to it, the court martial and the final sentence (all of which circumstances are well known to our readers), the Times adds: "President Grant approved the proceedings of the court, but, with a generous indorsement regarding Eggleston's bravery in the Modoc war, fixing the limit of the imprisonment at ten years. Yesterday Col. John Green, of the regular army and Capt. M. C. Wilkinson, of Gen. Howard's staff, committed Major Eggleston to the tender mercies of Gen. Pillsbury. His history is a sad one, and there is great sympathy felt for him by a large circle of friends."
