CONSTRUCTION COMPANY.—Let the people of Baker County think upon the subject of forming a Construction Company, with fifty or seventy-five thousand dollars capital stock, in shares of \$100, the stock to be paid in labor, grub, timber, &c., to be done and delivered in our county on the line of the railroad. This amount of work, labor, material, &c., will grade and tie the road in and through our county to Baker City, and for the labor performed our citizens can take transportation script or stock from the Railroad Company in payment for the amount of aid we give to the road in this way, and thereby be certain to receive a direct equivalent for the aid we give, besides enhancing the value of all the property in the county at least 100 per cent.

PLOWS.—We dropped into S. B. McCord's Blacksmith Shop last week, where we were shown a number of large breaking plows of his own manufacture. They looked like they were just what our farmers want to break up their land with. The largest one we looked at was made for Mr. Kinnison and with about four yoke of cattle before it, we are satisfied it will do good work.
