

THE HEART.

Bedrock—A Gambler, Shot and
Final of an Event-
ful Career.

From the Portland Bulletin.
Last night, April 2nd, at ten minutes past 10 o'clock, an alarm was sounded from a saloon on First street, near the Occidental Hotel, owned by John Wall. It was said that a man was killed. Those in the immediate vicinity heard the shots and ran to the spot. As near as we could ascertain the facts are as follows: About 10 o'clock a man named W. Baker, nicknamed "Boofock," and another man were playing cards in one of the back rooms, when Stewart, who had been drinking, came in, passing through the room, going toward a faro room further in the rear. As he passed through he made some remarks about Baker's playing, using rather hard language. It was unnoticed, and Stewart passed on to the faro room. After seating himself at the table he made himself very disagreeable by imposing upon those around him, until they ceased playing and went away. He followed them. As he passed through the room he again used hard words towards Baker, who told him to go away—he didn't want to have any trouble, rising up in his chair as he spoke. Stewart exclaimed, "Poo! I'll fix you, you s—of a b—h," and seized him. Baker was more than half the size of Stewart, and instantly banded beneath him. Stewart shoved his fingers into Baker's eye, almost tearing it from its socket. In less time than it takes to write it, Baker drew his pistol and fired two shots, one striking Stewart in the left breast, the powder burning and tearing the shirt considerably. At this Stewart started for the door, but his hands raised. As he attempted to open it he fell forward, crashing through the glass, then falling upon the floor, where after gasping once or twice he expired. At this juncture Baker came walking out very coolly, with pistol in hand, and stopped a moment to gaze at his fallen antagonist, then walked outside and asked a man what was the matter with his police whistle—it wouldn't blow—saying there must be dirt in it. He then asked the barkeeper for a handkerchief, at the same time handing him the pistol. After having the handkerchief adjusted he asked a gentleman to take him to jail, as he could not see. [We omitted to mention that as Stewart crashed him down in the corner, he exclaimed, after the shot, "Oh! my eye! He has torn it out!"] At this moment Officers Haines and Hudson came up and arrested Baker, taking him to jail, where he now lies, his eye present- ing a horrid sight.

We were furnished the following brief history of Stewart, who, we believe, has relations living in Salem. He was a man about 35 years of age, fine looking and well formed, and born in the county of Jackson, Missouri. When a mere boy he entered the Confederate service and fought against the flag of America. He was at one time a prominent personage in Mosby's Guerrillas, and assisted in burning the city of Lawrence in Kansas. At this place he was taken prisoner and placed in the Fort Leavenworth prison, where he was confined for many months. After being pardoned he went as Captain of the Sixth Kansas Regiment, where he displayed great bravery and won honor. After being mustered out of the service he went to Sweetwater, Wyoming Territory, on the Union Pacific Railroad, where he got into a difficulty with a man called "Dutch Joe." Ten shots were fired between them, Joe receiving two wounds, from which he died. He then went to Abilene, Kansas, on the Kansas Pacific Railroad, where he opened a saloon and dance-house. One evening a Sargent from the barracks across the river came over to his saloon. After drinking for a time the soldier became insolent and quarrelsome. He continued to create a disturbance until Stewart interfered, and the soldier drew his pistol and fired at him. Stewart drew his pistol and shot him dead in his tracks, and then fled to his horse back. The soldiers secured the country with the intention of bringing him back in pieces behind the saddle, but were unable to catch him. Meantime the remaining soldiers burned the saloon and dance-house to the ground where it stood. After a lapse of several months Stewart returned and stood his trial, and was acquitted. From this place he came to Walla Walla and to this place, where he has remained, following gambling as an occupation. After going through all this he at length falls away into an early grave, to follow those who have gone before him, and meet them face to face on the other shore.

The Surrender of the Senate.
The New York Sun says: "A confident hope was entertained when Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Nebraska revolted against the caucus delegation, and elected Senators who professed to be independent, that the infusion of this new element would act as a carb on the majority and improve the political tone of that side of the Chamber.
This expectation has been sadly disappointed by their course upon the Louisiana

question, and especially in regard to the resolution approving the President's action. Every one of them have surrendered to power and patronage, and exhibited a subservient which Chandler and Ramsey and Thayer never surpassed, and in which Carpenter with all his faults would not have joined.

The President has triumphed in the broadest sense, and is master of the situation. He dictated the terms of submission, and they were accepted without a murmur and without a change. The Senate was not content to applaud the usurpations, but stultified itself by voting down amendments, upon which its own committee was unanimous in 1873.

Mr. Morton differed with the majority of his Republican colleagues on that committee on some points of the controversy, but when he came to speak of the outrage perpetrated by Durrell, by means of which, and the troops provided in advance for the purpose, Kellogg and a fraudulent Legislature were forced on the people, his language was as emphatic as that of the others. Here is an extract from his minority report:

"The conduct of Judge Durrell, sitting in the Circuit Court of the United States, cannot be justified or defended. He grossly exceeded his jurisdiction, and assumed the exercise of powers to which he could lay no claim."
"His order issued in the Kellogg case to the United States Marshal to take possession of the State House for the purpose of preventing unlawful assemblies, under which the Marshal called to his aid a portion of the army of the United States as a posse comitatus, can only be characterized as a gross usurpation."

This is the sentiment of a Senator who has sustained Kellogg, knowing him to be the creature of "a gross usurpation," and who advocated the pretensions of Pinchback, one of the chief conspirators in that monstrous fraud. Yet when the Senate was called upon to affirm that Statement, the majority refused to verify it, and thus negatively declared a truth which no member of the body had dared to deny on his individual responsibility.

An amendment to the whitewashing resolution was offered in these words:

"That the use of the army of the United States to enforce the unwarrantable and void order of Judge Durrell, issued on the 5th day of November, 1872, and directing the United States Marshal to seize the building occupied as a State House for the assembling of the Legislature of Louisiana, and the employment of the soldiers on the 4th of January, 1873, to invade the hall of the House of Representatives of Louisiana, and to eject therefrom persons claiming to be members thereof, are contrary to the spirit of republican institutions, and cannot be approved by the Senate of the United States."

There is nothing partisan or harsh in this proposition, or any strong reflection upon the President to which his followers could take exception. But it recited unpalatable truths, and therefore was condemned by the following vote:

Yea—Messrs. Allison, Anthony, Booth, Boutwell, Bruce, Cameron of Wisconsin, Conkling, Cragin, Dorsey, Edmunds, Ferry of Michigan, Frelinghuysen, Hamilton, Harvey, Hitchcock, Howe, Ingalls, Jones of Nevada, Logan, McMillen, Mitchell, Morrill of Maine, Morrill of Vermont, Morton, Paddock, Patterson, Robertson, Sargent, Sherman, Spencer, Wade, West, and Windham—38.

When this failed another amendment was offered to test the majority in a different way:

"Provided, That nothing herein contained is meant to affirm that said Kellogg is de jure Governor of Louisiana."

The Republicans refused to give this condition a single vote, and it was rejected by nine majority.

The minority tried a third form of the question, thus:

"Provided, That nothing herein contained is meant to affirm that the body of men who assumed to elect P. B. S. Pinchback a Senator of the United States was the Legislature of the State of Louisiana."

That shared the same fate as the others and finally this modification was tried:

"Resolved, That nothing herein is meant to approve the military interference by the United States troops in the organization of the Legislature of Louisiana on the 4th of January last."

Every Republican who was present voted against it, and a majority of seven stands recorded in the negative. Thus the Senate committed itself distinctly in every form to sustain the President and to uphold Kellogg. A more abject surrender of opinion is not to be found in the existence of that body.

It is with good reason that the peevish friends of Grant rejoice, and proclaim loudly his triumph over all opposition in the Republican ranks. As he conquered the Senate, so he expects to conquer the Convention next year. He holds himself virtually nominated now, and what faction inside the party will dare raise a hand against him? The reins of the organization are held in the White House, and who can say that it will not be driven to suit the ambition and selfish aims of a venal President, who is an open candidate for reelection?

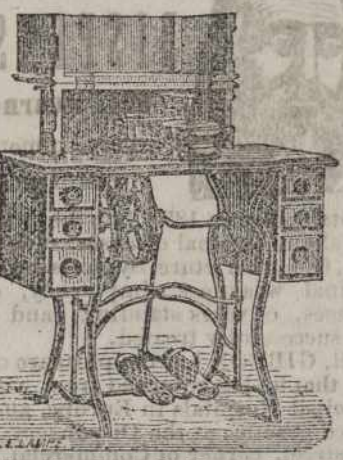
