CHINAMAN SHOT.—On last Friday evening a Chinaman arrived in this city from near Fort Sumpter in a suitable condition for a surgical operation. His name is Ah Sum. He had been shot by An Ding, his partner in a mining claim. They were quarreling about the ownership of a pipe, one claiming a half interest, while the other claimed the whole of the pipe, when An Ding ran and got his pistol and shot Ah Sum, who was lying down, through the shoulder. The ball entered near the neck, passed over the collar bone, ranged downward and outward, and lodged against the shoulder blade, through which it was extracted by Dr. Taft, who was called to attend the case. The injuries were then properly dressed, and the Chinaman has a fair chance to recover.
