SISTERS' SCHOOL BUILDING .- One day last week we visited the new building intended for the use of the Sisters' School .-We were surprised at the completeness and convenience of the structure. The buliding is 75 feet long by 24 in width, and is two stories high. It has good cellars, arched with brick in the basement. In the main cellar the well is located which will furnish water for the use of the occupants of the building. The water from the well will be carried to the different portions of the house by a pump. The first story is divided off into six rooms of convenient size for the uses for which they are intended, and all of them have ventilation from the outside. The second story is also divided off into six rooms, including the Chapel. The rooms here, as in the lower story, all have outside ventilation. The building is so roomed off that a large number of scholars can be accommodated, the school and recitation rooms being so arranged that the different departments will not conflict or intercept each other .-The plan of the building for a school was well conceived and drawn up, and the contractor and builder, John F. Chord, has done a good job, and followed the specifications. The style of architecture is unique but harmonious throughout. The whole of the inside of the building is to be hardfinished with two coats of plastering and will be completed by the 1st of July.


