CITY ELECTION.—On last Saturday we had a special election in our city for City Marshal, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Wm. Constable, and, although the office within itself is not of much importance, yet there was considerable excitement, and considerable anxiety as to who should be the successful man at the close of the polls. There were four candidates in the field, and each candidate had his friends. The candidates were Thos. M. Britten, W. J. Weber, Mose Bloch and Frank Palmer. As the time for closing the polls drew near the friends of each candidate were seeking to find another vote for his man, and off he would go in search of his victim. The best of feeling prevailed. All the saloons in our city, but one, complied with the State Law requiring such houses to close on all election days. At the count of the ballots after the polls had closed, the vote stood as follows—93 votes having been cast: T. M. Britten had 38 votes; Mose Bloch 32; Frank Palmer 14; and W. J. Weber 8 votes. One ballot was thrown out because some smart Aleek tried to vote for three candidates at one time, and folded three tickets together, but the Judges detected the trick and threw all three out. The Board of Trustees met after the Judges made their returns, the same evening, and canvassed the returns, and declared T. M. Britten elected Marshal of Baker City, and Mr. Britten being then and there present, took the oath of office, and is now our City Marshal, and all of our citizens are satisfied they have a good officer—one who knows his duty, and will attend to that duty.

EDUCATION.—Dr. Rowland, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has returned to Salem; and the Salem Record gives his opinions relative to school matters in Eastern Oregon. Of Baker County he says:

"Baker county has mining interests more than agricultural, and cannot as easily accomplish what Union and Umatilla have in the way of schools. Baker City Academy, however, under the charge of Prof. Barrett, has been prosperous; but he is elected Principal of Dalles high school; and the people of Baker City want to secure a choice teacher as his successor. That town is the most prosperous and thriving, in its appearance, in Eastern Oregon; and probably its prosperity is greatly due to the attractions offered by this excellent academy."

Dr. Rowland must have forgotten his visit to the Public School, under the supervision of Mr. S. H. Small. This school, in conjunction with the Academy and the Sisters' School, are ornaments to the educational interests of Baker County.

SCHOOL ELECTION.—On next Monday, between the hours of half-past five and half-past six, P. M., there will be a meeting of the legal voters of School District No. 5, at the Public School House in this city, to vote for or against a tax of three mills on the dollar of the taxable property of the District, to raise the money necessary to pay the debts of the District, and to repair the School House so as to make it suitable for winter use. The tax asked to be levied is a mere pittance, and we are satisfied that our citizens take enough interest in Public Schools to vote this tax. They will never miss the amount they will have to pay.

STRAWBERRIES.—We are under many obligations to Mr. A. J. Weatherly for a box of fine, ripe strawberries, raised by him on his ranch on Burnt River. Mr. Weatherly will have a good supply of Plums, Cherries, and all other small fruits. Our citizens can have them from there fresh and nice. He has taken great pains with his shrubbery and small fruits, and now has the satisfaction of knowing that he has been successful in raising all kinds of small fruits to perfection and in large quantities. We thank him for remembering the Printer.

PUBLIC SCHOOL EXHIBITION.—Mr. S. H. Small, teacher of the Public School in this city, intends to let his scholars have a Public Exhibition on Friday, the 2nd of July, for which a moderate fee will be charged for admittance. The proceeds of this entertainment will go to the aid of the School. The children and their teacher are satisfied they can make those who attend pass a pleasant hour or two. They want to do their share towards keeping up their School, and ask our citizens to come and see them in their exercises.

ON A VISIT.—Mrs. E. P. Cranston, of Sparta, and Miss Emma Goodspeed, of Union, are on a visit to their numerous friends in our city.

OATS.—Pap Levens received a large lot of oats yesterday, which he will sell cheap for cash.

INDIANS.—There were several Indians in our city yesterday, trading off horses.

A few weeks since a man named Tom Brown ran away from Walla Walla, and took a lot of horses that he had mortgaged to other parties. And now one Irwin follows suit, leaving behind him divers and sundry creditors, who mourn his departure to the tune of \$500 or \$600. Brown got away all right and has not been heard of in a month. Irwin took considerable property with him, and a man has been sent after him to see if he cannot persuade him to divide.

The Union thinks things look as if the military and civil authorities about Lapwai, Idaho, might collide. Mr. Langford some time ago got a judgment, giving him the right to possess the lands upon which stands the Lapwai Agency, and the Sheriff was ordered to put him in possession. But the officer was met by military force, and could not execute his writ. We understand that the officer in charge of Fort Lapwai has received orders to repel by force if necessary, Langford, the civil authorities, or anybody else who attempts to take possession of the premises. As there are three companies of troops at Fort Lapwai, it is not likely that the Sheriff of Nez Perce County will be able to raise a posse sufficiently strong to take and hold possession of the agency.

They are beginning to experience lively times in South Mountain mines. L. T. One of the furnaces is in constant operation, and the other will be started up as soon as coal can be got to run it. They have 100,000 bushels of coal at the pits, and are adding to it at the rate of 3,000 bushels per day. One hundred mules are engaged in packing it from the pits to the furnaces, and one hundred more will be put to work in a few days. Holders of South Mountain stock are feeling very good at present.

The Walla Walla Union says: "On Wednesday last we saw a man leaving the country in search of a better place. He settled here some years ago and was then poor, but in leaving he took with him 300 head of cattle and 100 head of horses. Besides this he has a farm worth \$6,000, and left 10 head of horses and 50 head of cattle on the place."

Hon. G. B. Baldwin made a clean-up of \$6,300 from his ground on North Elk, Idaho. Water having failed there, he has begun work on Spanish gulch.
