WASHINGTON, May 31.-Attorney General Pierrepont has sent the following circular to the Circuit Judges, District Attorn eys, and Marshals of the United States:

Assuming the duties of Attorney General of the United States, I find that the appropriation for the expenses of the courts for the present fiscal year is nearly exhausted. I find also that in some of the and skill in fighting the Modocs at the lava judicial districts the expenses have been extravagant without necessity and without honesty. Severer economy and stricter accountability must be enforced at all hazards. It is known to the Attorney General that in many instances a large number of witnesses have been kept for tion and Tecumsoh to the Klamath reserva-many days in attendance upon the courts tion. Scarface Charley and Shacknasty Jim many days in attendance upon the courts and paid for such attendance, whose testimony was not of the slightest value, and who, in many cases, did not testify at all, but were mere lazy loungers about the court for the sake of the fees; that exorbitant and unneccessary charges for the arrest, transportation and keeping of prisoners, for jurors, and for mileage have frequently been made, and that in other respects extravagance has prevailed which cannot be tolerated.

Hereafter the District Attorneys will be

held responsible for the number of witnesses who attend the courts, and Marshals will subpæna such witnesses only as the District Attorney may, in writing, direct. The order of the District Attorney directing the marshal to subpæna witnesses must state the names of witnesses, and the time when their attendance is required. Each marshal must keep a record of the names of all witnesses who attend, and the exact dates when they attend, and he must obtain a certificate from the clerk of the court stating the day on which each witness testifies. Such certificate of the clerk and direction of the District Attorney relating to witnesses must accompany the marshal's accounts when sent for audit. The records above required must be kept by the various District Attorneys and marshals in a book for the arrest, transportation, or keeping of prisoners, and the exact date of the service of such persons, and also when, where, and how the infleage charged was earned.

The Attorney General respectfully calls the attention of the Circuit and District Judges of the United States to the act of Feb. 22, 1875, relating to fees and costs, and asks the especial aid of the courts in compelling a strict enforcement of that statute. The Attorney General will hereafter require a duplicate of every account certified by the Judge under the act of Feb. 22,

MEACHAM'S INDIANS.

The following account of the return of Meacham's Indians we obtain from the Yreka Journal, of the 2d inst.:

Our readers will remember Meacham's visit here some months ago, to procure representatives of different Indian tribes in this vicioity and Oregon, from which he selected Harney and wife, of the Klamaths, and To-by Riddle, of the Modocs, with her white husband, Frank Riddle. On his way East he failed to secure a representative of the Piutes in Nevada, but obtained two of the Piutes in Nevada, but obtained two of the Modocs at Indian Territory, as well as other Indians. Oliver Applegate returned to this coast with Harney and wife and Tecumseh, the former arriving here Sunday, and the two latter the day previous. We interviewed Harney, the Rogue river chief, who seems to be an educated and intelligent Indian, having been raised at the Siletz reservation, and therefore as fully civilized as the white people. He says the troupe met with very good success, and traveled considera-ble, giving exhibitions in all the principal towns and citics. In some places the reli-gious people did not approve of their war dances or any other dances, and did not patronize them, else they might have been more successfull. They visited the President on the way, and remained in Washington about a month, visiting the various places of interest, with cariages at their disposal to ride wherever they desired. In New York they lost Dave Hill—supposed to be kidnapped in the hope of obtaining a reward. He had gone out alone, and disappeard very mysteriously without any clue to his abrupt departure. Every nook and corner of the city was diligently searched by the police, and disappeare to discovery and dispatches sent everywhere to discovery his wherebouts, but without success up to this date. It is also supposed that his kid-nappers have taken him to Europe, for ex-hibition there, and that he was probably taken on board the steamship Schiller, late-ly wrecked on the Scilly Islands. A full description of Hill was telegraphed to Europe, so that there can be no trouble in identi-fying him. David Hill was the head chief of the Klemeths, now questioned on the Klemeths. of the Klamaths, now quartered on the Klamath reservation near Fort Klamath, a wellinformed Indian and good orator, and his ople will, no doubt, be much excited over his kidnapping.
