

WHAT GRANT WILL DO ABOUT IT.

The New York Sun says, "with scarcely an exception, the Democratic press regard Grant's recent letter as a sly argument in favor of his election for at least one more term. A small portion of the Republican newspapers take the same view of it, and are openly hostile to its object. Another small section of the Republican journals are either ominously silent or speak in doubtful phrase; and these are unquestionable desirous of giving Grant a third term."

"But in spite of the plain drift of the letter, an influential majority of the Republican press effect to discover in it Grant's unqualified withdrawal from the list of candidates for 1876. This mode of treating the letter proves that the controlling elements of the Republican party are determined to be rid of Grant. Of course they will be successful. The Republican conventions in the leading States, and especially in the North and West, will follow the example of Pennsylvania and Ohio, and adopt resolutions against a third term. This will complete his destruction at the nominating convention next year, if he shall venture to appear there as a candidate."

"But Grant will do his best to inflict summary retribution upon the party which thwarts his aspirations for a third term. What Tyler and Fillmore were to the Whigs in 1844 and 1852, that Grant will be to the Republicans in 1876. He will not play so bold and manly a game as Tyler did to defeat Clay; he will rather practise the fox, subtle-policy of Fillmore, whose officeholders and confidential friends did their best to use up Scott."

"The vengeance of a President, whose party has refused to renominate him when he had set his heart upon it, was illustrated in the conduct of the calm and urbane a gentleman as Martin Van Buren. Defeated on the Sub-Treasury issued in 1830, he claimed to be compensated by a renomination in 1844. He was overcome in the Convention of that year by the friends of Gen. Cass, although Polk became the candidate. Van Buren would have beaten Polk in that campaign had not Silas Wright, his confidential adviser and the author of the Sub-Treasury measure, been the candidate for Governor of this State, and had not Benjamin F. Butler (not of Lowell), the bosom friend of Van Buren, been promised a seat in Polk's Cabinet."

"But in 1848, the Barnburner delegation from this State was excluded from the National Democratic Convention, and Cass was nominated! The hour for Mr. Van Buren to punish his enemies had now come. He had no patronage to bestow and no officeholders to marshal in line. But he was never at a loss for expedients. His personal followers assembled at Buffalo, and in conjunction with the Abolitionists and some anti-Taylor Whigs, gave him an independent nomination for President on the popular platform of Free Soil. The result was the overthrow of Cass, the regular Democratic candidate—an ample vengeance for his conduct in preventing Van Buren's nomination four years before."

"Grant is not enough of a politician to employ the tactics of Van Buren; nor has he sufficient prestige as a statesman to last four years after he is turned out of office. Not even in the coming year would any faction bestow upon him an independent nomination. His only chance to strike will occur in the next campaign after the Republican Convention has rejected him. He will improve it; and the cunning, slippery tactics employed by Fillmore when he defeated Gen. Scott will be his natural reliance. If the Democracy are wise, they will need no aid from him; but all that Grant can do, will then be done in their behalf."

GRANT'S FIRST BID.—The St. Joseph Gazette don't see that President Grant has helped things by his late bid for the presidential nomination in 1876. If Grant can get the nomination by securing the entire Southern vote, which he can get without any trouble, and capturing enough of Northern delegates to give him the majority he can not be elected. The prospect is encouraging for Democrats whether Grant is nominated or whether he and his Southern carpetbagger friends are ignored. The Gazette says: To talk to Grant about the traditions of the Republic, or to point out to him what Washington and Jefferson did, is very much like singing psalms to a dead ass—he cares nothing for such things. If it is possible, Grant will secure the nomination for a third term. His postmasters and various officials; his eight thousand office-holding serfs, will do his bidding, and, if possible, control the National Radical Convention. Blaine and Morton, Cameron and Conkling, Washburn and Pinchback, will doubtless rebel. The probabilities are that the Convention will break up in a grand row. Radicalism will get down to its principles, which being politics, party and plunder, there is no good reason for anticipating harmony. We like the prospect. Rogues are falling out; the family quarrel has commenced; the gods are making the Radicals mad; that will suffice for them; the Democracy will destroy them. It will be very gratifying to the Democratic party for the Radicals to nominate Grant, for notwithstanding his army of office-holders, it will be an easy matter to kill him. However, we are not particular. Those who secure the nomination over Grant will have to do so by virtue of their confessed opposition to Grantism, and as Grantism is Radicalism, pure and undiluted, it will be an easy matter to make the candidate, whoever he may be, swallow his own prescriptions. The outlook was never more cheerful for the Democratic party than it is at the present time."

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

The New York Sun of a late date says, "when the votes for State Senators were returned to the Governor and Council of New Hampshire, they found among them some persons who had not the constitutional qualification of residence; and some for another person in another district, whose identity could only be guessed at, inasmuch as the ballots contained the proper name of no citizen of the district. In one case the ballots appeared to

have been cast for Nathaniel Head, but no such person was known to exist. It was suggested that they might have been intended for a man named Nathaniel Head, but turning to the statute, it read as follows: "The full Christian name and surname of every person voted for, with the initial letter or letters of the middle name, and the usual abbreviations of junior, second, third, and the like, shall be written, or printed upon every ballot; and every ballot not thus prepared, and cast, shall be regarded as a blank, and not counted."

"In view of this solemn interdiction, the Governor and Council declined to count for Nathaniel the ballots cast for Nathaniel Head had no more right to them than William Jones or John Smith; and if the Governor and Council were not bound by the law, they might as well have given them to one man as to another. In this case, as in the other, they gave the certificate to the man who had a clear majority of legal votes, and it is amazing that anybody should have asked them to do otherwise. "The law was perfectly plain, and we believe that nobody thus far has pretended to misunderstand it. The function of declaring what persons appeared to be elected was imposed upon the Governor and Council; and the only question presented was whether they should declare a lie or the truth."

AN OREGON GOLD BRICK.—The Oregonian says:—One of the largest and consequently most valuable gold bricks ever brought to this city was on exhibition yesterday at the store of Millard & Van Schuyver, on Front street. The brick was brought down from Baker City, having been taken from the Virtue lode, near that place. This huge chunk of precious metal was the result of seventeen days' run by the Virtue Mining Company's Mill, which will serve to indicate the extreme richness of the lode. Pause, gentle reader, and ponder while you read. This brick weighs thirty-five pounds avoirdupois, or 565 14-100 ounces troy weight. Its fineness is 903, and its value \$9,485 25. In size it is but a fraction smaller than an ordinary clay brick. It was kept under a glass case, and during the day was the center of attraction. To gaze on that solid mass of auriferous metal was quite enough to make the eyes water and the palms itch, of even the most stolid. We were allowed to handle the brick, and never in all our extended reportorial career were we seized with such a desire to slip the bonanza in our left vest pocket and run for life. Had it not been for the strict surveillance of the gentleman who was kindly looking after the welfare of the brick, we might possibly never have framed this paragraph. The brick is on its way to the mint at San Francisco, and is soon to be transformed into bright twenty dollar pieces.

THE GREAT FINANCIER.—Senator Jones, of Nevada, to whom Grant wrote his wonderful financial essay, has been in Wall street and come back a sadder and wiser man. He had himself made a director in the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and undertook to buy the stock from 35 or thereabouts. He succeeded in running it up to about 170. Jones was at one time \$300,000 ahead and all went nicely. Jay Gould let him have the stock as fast as he was ready to buy, and when the Senator had completely loaded up with the snuff the wicked Gould took his scalp as neatly as Red Cloud himself could have done. The Senator is out some \$700,000.

It is said also that his present embarrassment is so great that he has been compelled to dispose of his interest in the St. James Hotel at a great sacrifice.—N. Y. Sun.

MR. CHADWICK called on us last Wednesday and desires us to state that by examining the journals of the two Houses of 1870 he was led to believe that the refusal of the Senate to concur in the amendment to the bill to create the office of Assistant State Treasurer was the final action of that body on the subject. But on a more careful examination he finds that the matter was reconsidered by that body, and the amendment procured in, though the amendment is not specified. He also states that he knows nothing of the bill further than that when it came to his office free from mutilation, signed by the Speaker of the House, President of the Senate and approved by the Governor.
