The Palace Hotel, now nearing completion in San Francisco, is the largest hotel structure in the world. It covers 96,250 square feet of ground and is seven stories high; 21,661,600 bricks were used in its walls; 3,000 tons of cast and wrought iron, and 4,561,524 feet of lumber and timber. It contains 1,060 windows, 377 of which are bay-windows; 962 rooms, none of less size than 16x16 feet, and 388 bath-rooms. It contains over three miles of halls; there are five passenger elevators, and seven grand stairways; there are 4.540 doors; 9,000 gasburners, and thirty-miles of gas and wateroipe. It requires 50,000 yards, or twentyeight miles of carpet. It can accommodate 1,200 guests, besides 360 servants and employers. And, best of all, there is not a dark or windowless room in the house.

THE ELECTION LAW.

The following is the full text of the law passed at the last session of the legislature relative to the disposal of liquors on the day of any State or city election:

Be it enacted by the Legislature Assembly of the State of Oregon: SEC. 1. That it shall be unlawful in this State for and person to barter, sell, give away or in any manner dispose of any intoxicating liquor on the day of any general or special election of State, county, or muni-cipal officers within the State, district coun-

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this act, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than two bundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail of not less than ten nor more than thirty days, in the discretion of the




