

How Not to Do It.

The following speech was delivered by Mr. Nash, of the Logansport Star, at the Indiana Editorial Convention:

When your committee assigned me the task of telling "How not to conduct a country newspaper," they recognized the eternal fitness of things, for "How to conduct a country newspaper" is prominent among the innumerable things that I don't know, and yet ignorance on this point is inexcusable, for no man can be connected with a country newspaper two hours and a half without receiving advice from many friends of the paper who know just how to do it.

Our facilities for acquiring knowledge are so great that every man, woman and child—except the publishers—knows how to conduct a country newspaper, and most of them would be at home on a metropolitan journal.

The man who is required to pay for material, aid and labor, or furnish copy, finds it the easiest thing imaginable to publish a paper; and why all the dolts drift into newspaper offices is a question that sorely puzzles suffering humanity.

If a man erects a building on his own ground, buys presses, types, and all kinds of printing material, writes and selects his matter, and pays his employees, he imagines that he owns a country newspaper. Nothing can be further from the truth. The office is owned by a joint stock company composed of an indefinite number of stockholders—ranging from five hundred to five thousand—each share representing a dollar and a half or two dollars; and every member of the concern imagines that he owns a controlling interest, whether his subscription be paid in greenbacks or advice. But I am digressing, simply wandering off among the wise men who are always ready to tell you how not to conduct a newspaper.

In publishing a country newspaper, don't get in too much news. It necessitates leaving out of the dog-fights, which are of greater interest to many of your readers.

Don't say anything about the political situation, lest you hurt the feelings of a county officer who gets his letter-heads printed at your establishment.

Don't say a word in your local columns about the merchant or manufacturer who has a standing advertisement in your paper. If he wants to keep his business before the people let him pay for it at twenty cents per line. That's business.

Don't neglect patent medicine advertisements. Fill your paper with them at half your regular rates; give an agent liberal commissions for procuring them, and take your pay in nostrums. This will encourage ready-made physicians, and fill your paper with "weighty interesting" reading."

Don't fail to publish a long sermon on some doctrinal point every week. This will gratify the man who wrote the sermon.

Don't fail to give your readers a full supply of original poetry. It will encourage home talent and make your paper popular with sentimental young ladies, noted for well ventilated hosiery and a charming ignorance of housework.

Don't spend too much time in reading proof. Let your paper be—like your life—full of errors.

Don't reject an article because it borders on the obscene. The roughs will endorse it and give you credit for wit. In short, publishing a paper in the interest of street corner loafers, hotel bums, and bleary-eyed ward politicians, and you will win the lasting gratitude of your successor, the sheriff.

OTTO.—In a lengthy editorial upon the political situation in Ohio, the St. Louis Republican, an independent paper, which cannot be charged with exaggeration, concludes that Gov. Allen will be re-elected this fall, inasmuch as there has been nothing in his administration that has weakened the power or strength of his party, and as the Republicans have failed to make a single case against the Democracy in that State. The Republican papers, particularly those in Ohio, feel that Hayes will not be elected. Good evidence that the party organs do not expect a Republican victory, is found in the fact that they have commenced a war of abuse instead of showing why Allen should be defeated and Hayes elected, and employing their time in throwing mud at the Democratic candidates, also the Republican journals are letting Allen alone, and making their fight on Carey, who twenty-five years ago made speeches against people drinking liquor. As Carey has been elected to Congress in a district said to contain more liquor saloons than any other in the United States, and that when the general ticket was in the minority in the district, the war upon him is not liable to do him much damage.
