He admitted being sold out by the leaders of the Independent par ty, but goes on with the campain nothing daunted. Mr. Whitney complained of not being able to find an Independent in this section. Fortunately a gentleman who has been casting his fortunes with every party for the past six years was present; and the two embraced each other in a cordial manner, shortly after which the Independent candidate summarily closed his remarks and subsided. 
