WRIT OF SPECIAL ELECTION.

To the Sheriffs of the several Counties within the State of Oregon: WHEREAS, At a general election held on the first day of June, A. D. 1874, the Hon. George A. LaDow was duly elected Representative of Oregon in the Forty-fourth Congress of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Since the said election, said office has become vacant by the death of said incumbent; and

WHEREAS, By provision of the Constitution of the United States, and the laws of this State, it has become the duty of the Governor or thereof to issue the writ of election to fill such vacancy;

Now, therefore, I, L. F. Grover, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby command you and each of you to notify the several Judges of Election within and for your several counties, to hold a special election for representative in Congress to fill the vacancy aforesaid, on Monday the 23rd day of October, 1875, and that you cause all proper notices to be given thereof according to law.

Given under my hand and seal of the State of Oregon, at Salem, this 22nd day of May, A. D. 1875. L. F. GROVER, Attest: S. F. CHAPMAN, Secretary of State.
