Good Schools.—We, with all other parents who have children to educate, know, and, having lived in a new country, feel the want of good schools to which we can send our children and keep them near us. Baker City now has three schools in successful operation. The Sisters' School is in a flourishing condition, and is one of the noble institutions of our city; the school at the Academy is taught by Mr. J. W. Gray, a gentleman of fine attainments, and we understand, he is succeeding well in imparting information to his pupils, of which he has some twenty or twenty-five; our public school is taught by Mr. S. H. Small. He has a very full school—in fact more scholars than any one teacher ought to be forced to teach—still he is giving general satisfaction, and is bringing his scholars along well, and deserves great credit for the interest he displays in the cause of education. With all these schools in operation we have still room and scholars for more, and are pleased to note the fact that Mr. P. D. Rothwell, an educated and practical teacher, is in our city, and, we understand, intends to open a private school next Monday. We have sent our children to him at Boise City, where he taught for about four years. He there gave general satisfaction and we believe he will do the same here. Our people cannot do better than to encourage him to stay with us. His school will be the means of retaining a large number of scholars with us, who, if he does not stay, will leave our city for some other locality, besides the fact that he will receive a good number of scholars from a distance, and, by his efforts, will help to build up the reputation of Baker City as a place where there are good schools sufficient to accommodate the wants of our people. Mr. Rothwell is a graduate of the Toronto Normal School, and has had large experience as a teacher, and takes pleasure in imparting information to his pupils.

CHINAMAN ARRESTED.—It is a fact well known in our community that persons who were celebrated, and were refused liquor at the saloons in our city, were in the habit of procuring the same at some other place unknown. This fact attracted the attention of our Deputy U. S. Marshal, J. M. Boyd, and he, with our late City Marshal, T. M. Britten, commenced looking up the case, and upon the arrival of Dr. Boyd from Portland last week, Mr. Britten informed him that he had found his man. Upon this information the Chinaman Ah Quee was caught in the act of selling liquor without having license, and was examined before the U. S. Commissioner for trial. This is a meritorious act upon the part of the late City Marshal, and the Deputy U. S. Marshal, our worthy Sheriff, gives him credit for his exertions and perseverance in this matter. Dr. Boyd will start with the Chinaman for Portland on next Saturday, where he will be tried for violating the United States revenue laws.

BOUND OVER.—Last week we stated that two men, McEwen and Cox, as we were informed, had been arrested for the robbery of the stage near Umatilla some two weeks since. It now turns out that our information as to the names of the parties was incorrect. The parties arrested were James Maxon and a man by the name of Berry. We understand the circumstantial evidence on their examination in Umatilla County was very strong, and that they were bound over in the sum of \$2,250 each, and, in default of bail, were committed to jail to await their trial at the next term of the Umatilla Circuit Court. We are sorry we made a mistake in the names last week, as we would not intentionally injure innocent persons.

A Conductor on the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad recently kissed one of his lady passengers, a Miss McCracken. She resented his action, and instituted a suit against the railroad for damages on the ground that she was kissed by the whole company through the conductor, as agent. An Illinois jury awarded her \$1,000, which is \$2.33 from each director or ten cents from each share holder.

A ledge of ruby silver, twenty-two feet wide, has recently been discovered in Kern County, Cal. within six miles of the town Kernville. It is said to be fabulously rich, and the peculiar thing about it is that it is the only mine of this character hitherto found on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

Our Financial Ruin.

The New York Commercial Advertiser in a recent number gives a most thorough account of the debts of the different States, principal counties, and chief cities. The result of its researches are not only to be deplored, but in their very essence are appalling. Great figures stand out on the wrong side of our books like "frowning giants," threatening our destruction. There are but few of our large cities which are not irredeemably lost in their indebtedness, and few which are not loaded with taxation—taxation merely to pay the interest on the great principal. The debts of our nation, all State and municipal governments, amount to the enormous sum of four thousand millions of dollars, paying an annual interest of two hundred and thirty millions, and drawing after them a total annual taxation of seven hundred and sixty millions. As Gov. Tilden showed in his lucid address at Utica, it takes all the gold and silver of our rich mines, all the cotton crops of the prolific South, all the petroleum of the flowing wells, and all the cereals of the fertile West, that are sent abroad, to meet only part of the expenses of government! "When you have sent forward," he said, "your gold and silver, your cheese, your butter, your petroleum, your wheat and your corn and your meat, and cotton and products of every kind; when you have raked and scraped this continent from the lakes to the Gulf and from the Atlantic to the remote interior, what have you done? When you have gathered together all these products, and paid the cost of carrying them to the seaboard—a cost larger even than the original cost of raising the products, with every exportable commodity carried to the Atlantic seaboard and deposited in the vessels of foreigners, you have paid ten months of one year's taxes."

This then is the point, to which the profoundest wisdom of the people must be addressed: The school question. Know Nothingism, and bloody-shirt, all fade into insignificance, when coming before the people at the same time as the probability of their country's financial ruin. How long shall we be able to stagger under so prodigious a burden? Shall it be increased by thieves and profane in office, or shall we relieve ourselves of its weight by judicious economies, by effective and persistent efforts, and by thorough and wholesome reform? There can be but one answer and but one way in which that answer can be carried into effect. If we mean to save ourselves from utter collapse and ruin, the honest men of the nation, who see the terrible catastrophe which threatens us, and who know how it may be averted, must join in a common endeavor to secure the rescue.

Some Prospect for Another Great Race.

The Boise Statesman of Nov. 24, says: Messrs. Sturgill brothers of Baker City, Oregon, have written to Mr. Joe. Pinkham and brother a letter to come to Boise City and run their horse Monte Cristo against Emma McCormick, mile heats best three in five provided our citizens will hang a purse of \$250 for the winning horse. The race to come off about the last of this month. We are not prepared to say whether this offer will be accepted or not. This is the first step toward the removal of Mormons holding federal offices in Utah. The removal was opposed by Senator Sargent, of California, on the ground that the incumbent had a right to his religious belief so long as he did not practice polygamy, and thereby break the laws of his country.

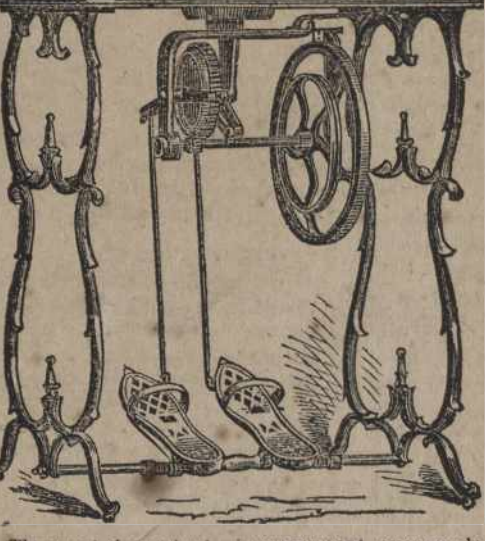
