JAMES GORDON MINE. - This mine is sitnated about five miles east of Baker City, and about four miles west of the Virtue Mine. There has been considerable work done by the parties, residents of our city, who own the quartz ledge-they have a shaft sunk to the depth of eighty or one hundred feet, well timbered. A short time since they had seventy ton of average rock from this mine worked in the Virtue Mine Mill, and sent the bullion to San Francisco to be minted. On last Monday they received their returns, and found that the seventy ton of rock crushed yiel ded them the nice little sum of \$1844, or at the rate of \$26,34 to the ton. The owners are well satisfied with their mine, and will continue to improve and work it. The ledges, as a general thing, in this county. as they are opened and developed, are proving themselves to be richer than first appearances indicated.

ROBERT EMMET MINE.-The owners of this mine, John Toy, Patrick Faulkner & George Crocker, had ten ton of their rock crushed in the Virtue Mine Mill, and the bullion received as the result is worth about \$200. We have seen it and think it will go over that figure-this is a 'yield of | \$20 per ton of top rock. As they have went down on the ledge the rock presents a better appearance. This mine is very near and above the Virtue. The opening of new mines near our city is progressing, and every appearance is that Baker City is located in the center of one of the richest mining districts on the Pacific Coast. The future prospects of our city are bright and encouraging.

SUMMIT MINE.-Mr. Morgan Keltner, Superintendent of the Summit Mine at Hogem, about thirty-five miles from our city, called on us yesterday. He informs us that they now have a shaft down on the vein of vein of quartz, that the ledge is about three feet wide, the rock looks well and that crushed in the mill yields at the rate of from \$12 to \$15 per ton. 
