The Law of Newspapers.

1. Subscribers who do not give express
notice to the contrary are considered as
wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If any subscribers orders the discon-
tinuance of their newspapers, the publisher
may continue to send them until all ar-
rearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take
their newspapers from the offices to which
they are directed, the law holds them re-
sponsible until they have settled the bills,
and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places
without informing the publisher, and the
newspapers are sent to the former direc-
tion, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that refusing
to take newspapers from the office, or re-
moving and leaving them uncalled for, is
prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The postmaster who neglects to give
the legal notice of the neglect of a person
to take from the office the newspapers ad-
dressed to him, is liable to the publisher
for the subscription price.
