LEFT FOR HOME.—Last Wednesday morning, Hon. R. A. Bensell and wife took the Yaquina stage for their home at Newport. For a few weeks they have been visiting friends in the valley, and attended the State Fair, and participated in Gen. Grant's receptions at Portland and Salem. Mr. Bensell remained in Corvallis several days in order to interview Hon. John Whitaker, M. C., upon his return from Yaquina Bay. Having had the pleasure of an interview with Senator Slater and Congressman Whitaker, after their recent visits to the Yaquina, he will, doubtless, give the readers of the GAZETTE the benefit of those interviews. Mr. B., under the nom de plume of "Rialto," has, for the past thirteen years, been a regular correspondent of the GAZETTE, and has done more to build up the material interests, and develop the resources of the county, than any other single individual. For these unceasing labors of love, and for the further reason that he is a man of more than ordinary ability, have the citizens of Benton county twice elected him to represent them in the State legislature. He is an indefatigable worker, and rises above all personal and local considerations.

MECHANICS' FAIR.—The Mechanics' Fair, in Portland, is now in successful operation, having opened on last Monday, the 20th inst. Up to Sunday afternoon there had been 278 applications for space as exhibitors, showing that the pavilion, large as it is, is likely to be well filled. In fact some agricultural implements were denied admission, for lack of space. The Fair promises to be a grand success. The fact that intoxicating liquors are not allowed to be sold in the pavilion, is a grand triumph for morality and decency. To Rev. J. H. Acton belongs the credit of preventing the carrying out of the programme of the "wine room" in the pavilion, for which a license or permit had been obtained from the managers. This was a move in the right direction. Certainly there are enough "drinkeries" in Portland, and women and children are insulted enough upon the principal streets of that city, without forcing them into more immediate contact with the evil, while visiting the fair.

STILL LIVES.—Notwithstanding the numerous obituaries published in the papers of Oregon, Calvin B. MacDonald still lives, and is enjoying excellent health. From a private letter, of recent date, to W. P. Keady, of this city, we learn that Mac is engaged in the preparation of a "History of Sacramento," a splendid illustrated work, to cost \$10 per volume, Thompson & West, publishers. Mac writes "that he never was quite so nicely situated in all his life; have elegant quarters, and work as I please, on high salary. No more drudgery on newspapers for a long time." His numerous friends in Oregon, will be pleased to learn of his good fortune, and trust that it may attend him during his entire life time. On the night of the 23rd inst., the Temperance Legion, of San Francisco, 1,000 strong, were to give him a benefit, at which he was to make a half hour speech. SEED WHEAT.—Mr. Sam. Daw, of this county, has succeeded in creating quite a sensation in California, as well as in this State, by his White Russian Wheat, of which several notices have been published in the GAZETTE. Mr. Daw wrote a letter to Mr. D. W. Thompson, of Santa Barbara, Cal., in answer to several interrogatories, concerning this wheat, which was published, with flattering comments, in the Santa Barbara Press, of the 9th inst. The following is Mr. Daw's letter, referred to above: CORVALLIS, BENTON CO., OREGON, Oct. 4, 1879.—Mr. Thompson—Dear Sir: I have just received your letter asking information about the Russian wheat. My experience in three years has been very satisfactory. Two years ago last May I had one pound; now I have 800 bushels. More than one hundred men came to see it, growing, and they engaged over 300 bushels at \$3 per bushel. I was present at the State Fair at Salem yesterday. I sold 30 bushels. All the wheat I have left is for seed. I have McCracken, Portland. You can get one pound or fifty bushels. I think you would do well to experiment with some of it. I sowed some the 10th of May, and it was ripe on the 25th day—40 bushels to the acre. The best acre this year was 85 bushels. Yours, etc., SAMUEL DAW.

PARTIALLY UNDOOED.—The recent "blow," which did considerable damage in various localities throughout the Willamette valley, and reminded one of the windstorms on the Atlantic side, made sad havoc of the tin roof of the State building, at Salem. Several hundred feet square of the metal roof was lifted off, and a portion of it carried by the wind two blocks away. It presents a very bad prospect for the winter, and certainly must have been of very inferior workmanship and material. The loss will amount to not far from one thousand dollars.

We understand it was a very pleasant affair.

Prof. E. A. Milner, who had been confined to his room, by illness for a couple of weeks, resumed his duties in the school room, last Monday, although scarcely able to do so. The Professor has lost several pounds weight by his illness. We are pleased to note that Wallis Nash, Esq., our respected fellow citizen, has almost entirely recovered from his severe attack of rheumatism. The past week he has been engaging in his favorite sport of duck hunting.

Mr. Samuel Irvin, who is engaged in teaching in E. Portland, came up last Saturday to attend the arrangements for the funeral obsequies of his beloved sister, Mrs. Joseph Tyler. Mr. Irvin has a very full school and has been employed for another year. Mr. Geo. M. Starr, of Alaska, has laid upon our table a potato of the Irish Gull variety, a very handsome root, weighing two pounds and three-quarters. It is a handsome, smooth potato, and not formal of excessiveness and waste, as is frequently the case with large potatoes.

Hon. F. A. Chenoweth, accompanied by Hon. John Whitaker, M. C., started for Yaquina Bay, in a private carriage, on Friday of last week, and returned on last Monday evening. They were favored with sunshine—no rain—and comparatively good roads, hence the trip was a pleasant one. We are pleased to learn, from President Arnold of the State Agricultural College is free from debt, and has money in the treasury. This happy state of affairs is owing to the excellent financial management of the President and the board of regents.

In Corvallis, Oct. 13th, 1879, James Wood, aged 15 years, 5 months and 9 days. Though called very suddenly and unexpectedly, to pass over the stream of death, he was fully prepared to go, and while dying, requested his friends to meet him above. May God comfort the weeping friends. Deceased was a son of J. C. Wood, formerly of this county, but now of Waukegan, W. T. James was here for the purpose of going to school this winter. His elder brother arrived in this city, last Saturday, never heard of his sickness and death, until reaching Albany. At the residence of her brother, Mr. Andrew Enrick, of this city, Mrs. Elizabeth Trost, died Oct. 12th, 1879. Deceased had been ill for some months and some time since came here for medical aid. On Saturday morning, October 12th, she ceased to suffer and followed her babe that died three weeks before. She leaves a husband and seven children to mourn their loss.

OREGON AND WASHINGTON COLONY LAND COMPANY.
Farmers of Benton County, Again.
Ed. GAZETTE: In the last issue of your paper is a communication from Messrs. Wrenn & Holgate, in which they refer to "foreign real estate and printing monopoly," and also call this company by the pet name of "land grabbers." They also give you to understand that they can advertise and sell your lands without any interference from outsiders.

Now, perhaps, this is all so. And yet it is barely possible that they may leave some little work undone which others, by scrapping along the edges, may find. The work of bringing before the public the lands and resources of Oregon is a large undertaking, and it is one in which, as yet, but very little has been done. In this matter California, by her industry and expenditures of large sums of money, has gotten away with us. This is not a foreign company, but a company organized in Oregon, and put in operation by Oregon men and money. Nor is it a "printing monopoly." It still proposes to allow the OREGONIAN, GAZETTE, West Coast Stranger, and a few other papers to live. As to their being "land grabbers," we suppose all real estate agents are alike in this regard.

We are well pleased with the handsome efforts put forth by Messrs. Wrenn & Holgate to advertise and sell the lands of such persons as desire to sell. It would be unpretentious to call them land grabbers or monopolists. And in the matter of advertising for nothing, they beat us. We can't afford to advertise for nothing, nor do we desire to do it, for the reason that our best customers are so constituted that they would not accept of substantial benefit without paying for it. They seem to be imbued with the idea that which costs nothing is worth nothing. But the great work to be accomplished is not to advertise lands here in Oregon only. Experience shows that there is in the States, throughout the Union, surprising ignorance of Oregon, generally, and especially of its soil and climate, price of land, situation as to rivers, railroads, cities, mills, timber, productions and market prices, improvements on land, and where each farm described can be found, who owns it, and what are his terms of sale; and most of all this information needed by families who contemplate immigrating to this State; and while other States have been active in showing what inducements they have to offer to the immigrant, Oregon has done but little. The object of this company is to do all it can to lay before the people of the Atlantic States full and reliable information (in the words and language of each farmer) of all that an immigrant would naturally inquire about, before he starts from home.
