## PACIFIC COAST.

## Oregon.

The Albany Register has adopted the pre-pay system. Semble Bros. Van.

There have been forty five marriages in Umatilla this year up to October 6th.

An effort is being made by the temperance people at Eugene City to enforce the Sunday law against saloons.

The sentence of H. C. Dale, defaulting sheriff of Yamhill, is five years in the penitentiary and a fine of \$5000. The latter, of course, he can never pay.

From Prineville: Crops turned out very well, and grain is of good quality. Oats are worth 50 cents per bushel. Enough wheat is now raised to consume the crop, and a great mill, with one set of burrs, grind it into flour.

An attempt was made recently, by two highwaymen, to rob Mr. James H. Harris, between Dallas and Ferry lake, after selling wheat, and while returning home with \$500, after night.

The Dallas Itinerant says of the new town of Derry, on Col. Nesmith's place: "The location of this place is as good as that of any town in the country, being the center of an agricultural country that cannot be surpassed. Col. Nesmith will soon have for sale several lots in the new town, the site of which is on the west side of the road, the land adjoining on the east having been deeded to the railroad company for warehouses, etc. The new town will no doubt soon grow to a place of considerable importance."

Hillbush Independent: Mr. Tompkins, who lives on the mountains above Glencoe, dug a well recently some fifty feet in depth, and found plenty of water, which lasted for several days. Last week, while working in the vicinity of his newly found water, Mr. T. heard a rumbling noise like distant thunder, and glancing in the direction of his well, was surprised to see the earth, trees, logs and all disappearing from view for several feet around his treasure. For a moment he was thunderstruck, when it gradually flashed through his mind that the bottom of the well had fallen out. Upon investigation much proved to be the case. It is barely possible that this strange action of nature will bring to light another Mammoth Cave. At all events the bottom of the well is out, and Mr. Tompkins will not undertake to repair it.

## TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

One thousand and twenty immigrants arrived at New York on the 26th.

The epidemic at Memphis was declared ended on the 25th, by the board of health.

During the week ending October 25th, the foreign specie receipts at New York was \$5,388,825.

All the cabinet makers of San Francisco are on a strike, demanding 25 per cent increase of wages.

The official returns of the Ohio election give the Republicans the legislature by 31 majority in joint ballot.

A report has been received that Spotted Tail's Indians in southwestern Dakota had a serious outbreak last week.

The schooner Eather Cobos went ashore at the mouth of Rogue river on the 25th, while being towed. The cargo, principally canned salmon, was saved in a damaged condition. The vessel is a total loss.

Intelligence from St. Petersburg has reached Berlin that a new revolutionary party in Russia has distributed the first number of their journal, entitled The Will of the People. It declares war against the government and its issue is very violent.

An accident occurred on Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad on the 27th. An engine containing five persons jumped the track and turned over in a ditch. D. A. Adams, a telegraph operator, was killed and the others badly wounded. J. C. McMillan, brakeman, and N. W. Holmes have since died.

News has been received by the City of Peking from China that the Chinese Merchants' Steamship Company had been putting on a line of steamers to Honolulu, and that they will probably continue the route to San Francisco. The company is very wealthy and under able management, and has already succeeded to a great extent in crowding out foreign steamship lines on the Chinese coast.

The state department has advised that the British and German governments have favorably received the recent circular issued by the United States calling attention to the determination of this government to prosecute all persons who have violated the federal law against polygamous marriages. Reports from consular offices at the principal points of shipment of Mormon converts state that the police are energetically at work to stop such emigration by formal notification that our government will arrest and prosecute emigrants of this sect immediately upon their arrival, etc. Secretary Evans now feels confident that with the co-operation of the governments addressed, the inflow of Mormon proselytes from the old world will be almost entirely cut off, and with the energetic measures now being enforced in Utah, that the whole system will speedily crumble in pieces.

She was born in Illinois, December 2d, 1838, and in 1844 her parents moved to Iowa and settled in Jefferson county, where they resided until 1851, when they moved to Appanoos county. In 1859 they started across the plains to Oregon, and on the second day of July, on the bank of the North Platte river, she was married to Frederick Troxel, and they came on to Oregon and settled near Roseburg, and removed from there to Benton county in 1862, where they have resided until her death.
